Britain Regaining Her Holdings Abroad

The foreign investments of the people of the British Isles at the present time are estimated at around \$17,000,000,000, a reduction of about \$3,000,000,000 from the estimated holdings of the British people just before the war, according to a study of this question just completed by the research department of the Bankers Trust Company of New York. As the sales of foreign investments to assist in financing the war approximated \$5,000,000,000, this indicates a recovery of something like \$2,000,000,000 in foreign holdings since the close of the war. The geographical distribution of England's external investments is estimated roughly by the Bankers Trust Company to be about one-half with her Dominions and one-half in foreign countries. Prior to the war their foreign investments yielded the British people an income of approximately \$1,000,000,000. The income from this source in 1923 was around \$750,000,000.

The only one of the British Dominions holding any substantial amount of foreign investments is the Dominion of Canada. In accordance with the accepted British policy of winning foreign trade by financing the buyer, at the close of 1923 Canadian banks were loaning to the residents of foreign countries in the neighborhood of \$350,000,000. Direct foreign investments, other than bank loans, aggregated in 1921 over \$40,000,000. Such investments at the present time are somewhat less than this amount.

Lumber for a Small House in One Log

Nearly enough lumber for a small bungalow—8500 board feet—is in a ponderous cut from the body of a California mountain giant.

High in the Sierras, where stretch some of the world's richest timber reserves, the great tree was felled by lumberjacks with crosscut saws, toppling at the last urge of wedges and crashing with a roar audible across the valley. Voracious power saws bit it into sections in no more time than was required for the single falling cut.

Power of Tides Used to Move Old Bridge

The slow, mighty strength of tides was employed uniquely recently when it was made to lift an old railroad bridge on San Francisco Bay and tow it nearly a mile down the bay. The structure was moved in its entirety in less than a day, without the slightest damage.

Shortly after midnight, at low tide, several hundred men fell quickly to work. A number of barges were floated under the bridge. Toward dawn, the rising tide lifted the ponderous structure from its concrete bulkheads and bore it down the bay.

Marine Pests Bore Into Creosoted Piling

Wood in general, and valuable piling along waterfronts in particular, are the favorite delicacies of these destructive wood-boring marine pests scientifically called "Lampronia." Against them the resources of the United States Forest Service's Forest Products Laboratory are being marshalled.

These tiny creatures, the largest never more than a quarter of an inch long, are a serious problem on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. Coming in contact with piling thro' the chance of tide or drift, and lodging in a crevice or on the surface, they eat away the soft wood, leaving the remainder in riblike ridges. After a time a pile may snap in two.

Lampronia are harder to combat than are other marine pests with a taste for wood, because they will penetrate wood impregnated with creosote.

Output of Pig-Iron in Great Britain

The British production of pig-iron during February last totalled 612,700 tons as against 536,500 in January and 543,400 tons in February 1923, according to advices received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York from the British Information Service. This total production included:

194,400 tons of hematite,
215,300 " " basic,
137,500 " " foundry,
33,200 " " forge pig-iron.

The output of steel ingots and castings during February also amounted to 767,600 tons as compared with 694,300 tons in January and 707,100 tons in February, 1923. There were 202 blast-furnaces in operation in Great Britain at the end of February, as against 197 at the end of January and 204 at the beginning of the year.

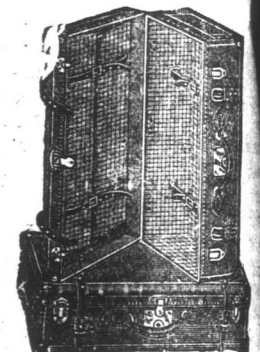

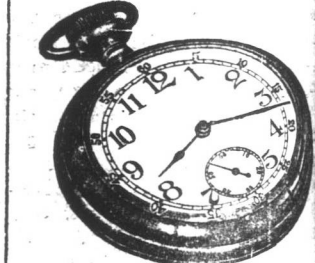
