DR. JOHN MURPHY, RAM.C.

We regret to announce that in spite of the unremitting attention of his relatives, brother physicians and attendants and the gallant fight made by the patient himself, Dr. John Murphy passed away at 5 o'clock this morning.

Stricken with infantile paralysis on the 10th of September, during the performance of his professional duties. Dr. Murphy remained conscious of his surroundings until three hours before the end came, and even, when possible, assisted those who were attending him. A week ago when his condition was considered critical the Sacred Rites of the Church were administered. The deceased was 32 year of age and was the youngest son of the Hon, J. J. and Mrs. Murphy. Educated at St. Bonaventure's College, he proceeded from that institution to Ampleforth College, Eng., and afterwards completed his course of study at the London Hospital Medical College and obtained his degree in 1916. REACHED CITY AT 12.30 TO-DAY.

The east bound express which left Port aux Basques Wednesday mornnine cars met with a derailment at 3 p.m. yesterday at the 204th mile, four miles west of Arnold's Cove and as a result did not reach the city until 12.50 to-day. The accident occured on a fairly level part of the road. The baggage car, diner, day coach, sleeper, and two second class cars left the rails, and sped over the ties several hundred feet before coming to a standstill.
