We agree with 'A Reader' that a Rest Room for ladies would be greatly appreciated convenience, and if she, or any others will take steps to secure such a room, she may rely on the support of the G. W. V. A. to that end as there is not a returned soldier who would not gladly contribute toward any comfort for the ladies who have accomplished so much for the soldiers comfort during the war.

We trust that the foregoing will convince 'A Reader' that the G. W. V. A. is neither a luxury, nor a loafing place, but is instead a necessary meeting place in which a branch of a great and powerful organization may transact its important business and promote the welfare of its members.

SOUTH YARMOUTH

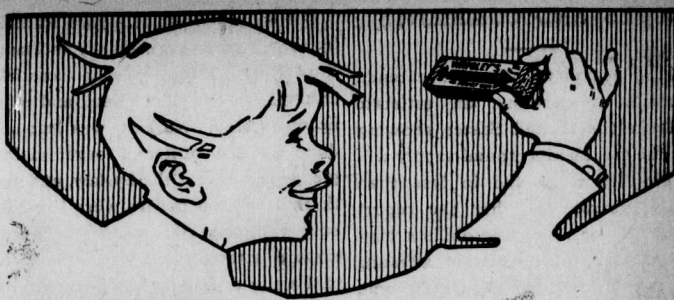
