HONDURAS, Nov. 15.—The rebellion headed by General Longinos Sanchez is practically ended. The revolutionary forces have been utterly routed by President Bogran's army, and the President is in full possession of the capital city, with the exception of one barrack, where the remnant of the defeated army is closely imprisoned. At daybreak yesterday Bogran, with 2,000 tsoldiers, advanced upon the capital. Sanchez had all the approaches guarded with artillery, which did very effective work. His position was charged several times by Bogran's forces before it was carried. Sanchez's troops were at last routed and took refuge in the capital. The London Stock Market Demoralized,

The Great House of Baring Bros. in Difficulty.

Panic on the New York Stock Exchange Disquieting Rumors from Abroad Business in the States — The Bank of Montreal's

London, Nov. 15.—The street dealings at the Stock Exchange yesterday were very unsatisfactory. Every department was demoralized. The fact that over £1,000,000 in consols had been sold led to a reaction. The rush for realization increased on best rumors that notable financial houses were involved. The influx of £1,039,000 in gold into the Bank of England from Paris failed to relieve the strain. Several discounters refused bills at 6 percent. or on any terms, owing to the general feeling of uneasiness. The heaviest fall was in Uruguay securities, which declined 6. Argentine declined 2½ to 4, American railroads 1 to 34, English railroads ½ to 2. On the Paris Bourse prices were weak. Rio Tino dropped 17 francs. The Berlin Boerse was very unsettled under the reports of financial troubles in London.

News was received from Buenos Ayres to-day that the financial situation there was aggravated. There are fresh rumors of difficulties outside of the stock market.

As a result prices for nearly all the active stocks opened § to 2 per cent. above last night's close, the externe gain being made by Northern Pacific preferred.

There is a very unsettled feeling in financial circles. Some uncasiness was caused yeaterday by a rumor that Baring Bros., the great London bankers, were in difficulties.
