THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

TORONTO, Aug. 24—11 p.m.—Since last night
the center of the depression has moved north-
ward from Pennsylvania to the Georgian Bay
causing variable winds and some rain in On-
tario, and an easterly gale along the Lower St.
Lawrence. In the Maritime Provinces and the
Northwest Territories the weather has been
generally fair and warm.

The Pastor's Anniversary.

Sunday was the first anniversary of the
pastor of Rev. M. P. Talling at St.
James' Presbyterian Church. The ladies
had assiduously devoted their attention to
the decoration of the interior of the edifice
to mark the special services held on the
occasion. Very pleasing and pretty were
the results. The platform was buried under
a magnificent collection of floral beauties
while the gallery fronts were draped with
evergreens. The lecture room was also
handsomely ornamented. To a crowded
congregation in the morning Rev. J. A.
Murray, of St. Andrew's Church,
preached an eloquent and lengthy
sermon. In the afternoon Dr. Ferguson
and Rev. M. P. Talling addressed a large
gathering, the latter incidentally referring
to his vacation trip, from which he had just
returned. The pastor occupied his own
pulpit in the evening, taking his text from
Exodus: "My presence shall go with thee
and I will give thee rest." During the
year, the pastor, though his God's
presence had been with the church,
interesting services at the New Church.

The services in the Christian Church,
corner Elizabeth and Dundas streets, were
conducted both morning and evening by Rev.
A. N. Gilbert, A.M., of Cleveland, Ohio. At
both meetings the edifice was crowded to
the doors, extra seats having to be placed
along the aisles in order to accommodate the
large gatherings. The building has just
been refitted at a cost of about \$500, the
funds for which were furnished by Dr.
Leonard, U.S. consul, city. This sum has
been repaid him with the exception
of \$100, by citizens of London. The
church has now a pretty interior
with a good-sized choir gallery. It
will furnish seating accommodation for
about 400 people. The attendance
Sunday must have been encouraging to the
adherents of the denomination. Rev.
A. N. Gilbert, A.M., who preached,
is one of the most prominent and
able young divines of the Dis-
ciples of Christ in the United States.
He has just conducted a series of evangel-
istic meetings at Bethany Park Assembly,
near Indianapolis, Ind., the denominational
Chautauque. He prepares every year the
denominational commentary on the inter-
national Sunday school lessons, a com-
panion volume to Peloubet's, published at
Cincinnati. He has traveled on all the
continents except Australia, and has
recently been pastor of Euclid Avenue
Church of the Disciples in Cleveland,
Ohio, where he has just resigned to
enter the evangelistic field. At
both services the reverend gentleman
delivered powerful discourses, fully sustain-
ing his reputation as an efficient minister
of the Gospel. He will conduct two more
meetings at the Christian Church, one this
evening and the other this evening.
On Wednesday he leaves for other fields
of labor. Next Sunday Dr. McElt, of Cleve-
land, Ohio, secretary of the General
Christian Mission Convention, will preach
morning and evening, and will hold meet-
ings in the church for a few evenings fol-
lowing. The musical portions of the
evening Sunday were of the highest
order, the quartet, Mrs. Kellie, Miss
Griffith, Mr. C. W. Davis and Mr. Fred
Soper, giving exquisite renditions at both.
