Take Steps to Form a "Civil Rights League."

FLETCHER, Jan. 27.—The mass meeting keld by the colored citizens of the county of Kent in Victoria Hall at Chatham on Friday was fairly attended considering the short notice given. About 100 persons were present, representing the towns of Chatham and Dreaden, and the townships of Dover, Chatham, Raleigh and Tilbury East.

Mr. J. C. Richards (chairman of the Committee on Calls, appointed by the Literary Association of Chatham) called the meeting to order and briefly stated the object of the meeting as follows: "To consider a course to be adopted for the uniting of the colored people of the county of Kent into a league for their mutual protection and advancement."

After all the members of the committee had spoken, they left the matter in the hands of the meeting. Mr. A. V. Thompson was called to the chair, and Mr. R. W. S. Johnson was elected temporary secretary. In a few moments the house was in wild confusion. Men stood on the floor shouting at the top of their voices to the chairman, each trying to got his attention. The chairman got confused and said that he was at sea, amid loud laughter and choers. Order was finally restored and the meeting settled down to business.

It was moved by Mr. R. W. S. Johnson, seconded by Mr. N. Murray—
That we, the colored citizens of Kent county, moeting assembled do hereby assert that

That we, the colored citizens of Kent county in meeting assembled, do hereby assert that we are in favor of the forming of a civil right league among the colored citizens of the county of Kent, and that a call be made to the colored citizens of a said county to meet in convention.

After a lengthy and heated 'discussion, a committee of five was appointed to make a call to the colored citizens of said county for a convention to be held in Chatham on Saturday, Feb. 7, to fix the number of delegates for each division to attend the convention for the purpose of forming the league. There were several speeches made urging the people to action.

The committee met on Saturday at 10 o'clock in Murray's block, King street east, and issued the call to all parts of the county, fixing the number of delegates in towns at five and in rural districts at two in each school section. Meetings will be held in every division in the early part of the week to appoint delegates. It is believed that every right thinking man who has any race pride will do his endeavor to bring about a better state of affairs.
