Grand Dominion Day Celebration.
It begins to look as if London will have
first-class attractions on the public holi-
days during the coming season. Worthy
of special notice are the extensive prepa-
rations of the Ancient Order of Foresters for
Dominion day, July 1. The proposition is to
hold a big demonstration to which
Foresters throughout Western Ontario will
be invited. If citizens give the affair the
support which it deserves a second day's
programme will be prepared for July 2, a
chief feature being an immense firemen's
demonstration. If this grand two days'
celebration be taken hold of in a liberal
spirit thousands of strangers will be
brought to the city. The action of the
committee, from all the A. O. F. lodges, in
bringing this matter forward at an early
date, is to be commended, as arrangements
for excursions from other cities and towns
can be more readily made.

Miss Cannell; solo, Mr. Soper; quartet,
Miss Burney and Messrs. Wright, Soper
and Cronie; solo, Miss S. Purdon; reading,
Mr. W. Webster. Rev. M. P. Talling, the
pastor, presided, and made everybody at
home in a welcoming address.

The Dairymaids' Supper.
A successful rendition of the cantata,
"The Dairymaids' Supper," was witnessed
in Christ Church school-room Thursday eve-
ning by a large audience. The entertainment
was held under the auspices of the guild of
the church. The performers were each
harmoniously attired in plain but at-
tractive costumes that suggested strongly
the dairy farm's shady dell, while the milk
pails and other dairy paraphernalia were
not forgotten. Soloists and chorists
evinced careful training, and did justice to
their respective parts. The greater share
of the vocal efforts fell to the lot of Mrs.
Welsh, Misses Reed, H. Wright, J. G.
Goldsmith, T. Wright and M. Smith, and
Messrs. Welch, Welch, Logan,
Mihinnick, Faunt and McCormick. A
catchy novelty, the dairymaids' drill, was
introduced, in which the young ladies were
put through a number of graceful calis-
thetic exercises by their captain, Miss F.
Smith. Mr. E. Green acted as accompanist.
The audience testified to the worth of the
entertainment by requesting the manager,
Mr. Wicks, to reproduce the cantata on
Wednesday evening.

Thatcher's Minstrels.
George Thatcher's minstrel company
appeared Thursday evening before an
audience which filled the Opera House
to the doors. The company consisted
of from 25 to 30 persons. The first
part, introduced by a really
solo and quartet work by Messrs. J. W.
Moore, Lewis and Frilman, the most
acceptable being "Katie Darling," by Ray-
mond Moore. The cat duet of Thatcher and
Shepherd was a novelty, and J. A. Cole-
man's dancing was clever and funny. How-
ever, the setting of the first part was not
pretty and the costumes were unattractive.
The one great feature of the second part
was Frank La Monde's slack-wire per-
formance which, for a man of his build,
was one of the best exhibitions of the kind
ever seen here. The sets of the Gondoliers
were splendid. Taken as a whole the
show contained many good
features, notably, its singers; but nothing
strikingly original was attempted, nor was
it equal to the performances of the majority
of professional troops which have visited
London in recent years.

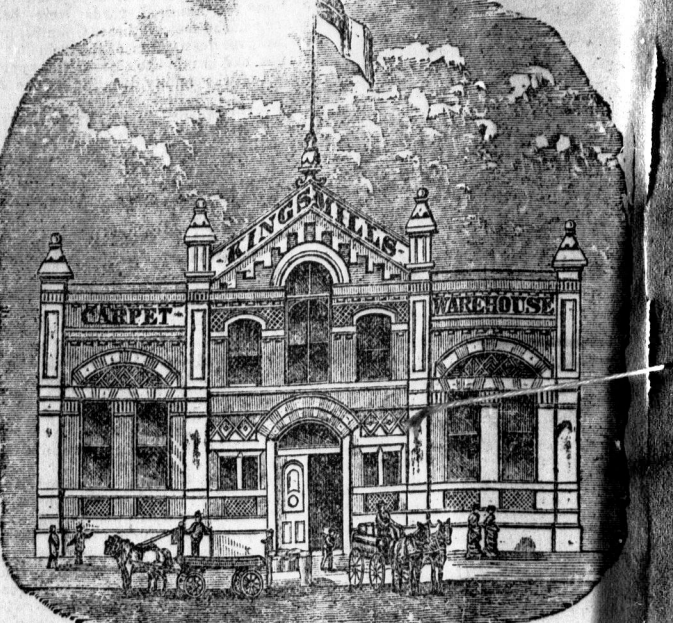
