Finer weather has prevailed in the Northwest, whilst in Ontario thunder storms have become more numerous. Great heat prevails over the larger portion of the continent. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Requinamit, 54°-68°; Qu'Appelle, 54°-74°; Port Arthur, 56°-94°; Sarnia, 68°-88°; Toronto, 64°-75°; Montreal, 58°-70°; Halifax, 62°-65°.
