—The builders of the city picnic at Port
Stanley on Aug. 4.

—Mr. S. O. Perry has been appointed St.
Thomas ticket agent of the L. E. and D.
R. R.

—The Memorial Church choir, London,
broke up camp at Port Stanley on Satur-
day.

—Mr. John Kennedy, of Elderton, has
entirely recovered from the effects of his
recent accident.

—The M. C. R. annual excursion to
Niagara Falls on Saturday was patronized
by 2,000 people.

—The many friends of the family will
regret to hear that Mrs. Macpherson, an old
resident of London, is seriously ill at the
family residence, Lichfield street.

—The Bishop of Huron on Saturday con-
ducted the services at the burial of Mr.
Thomas Trivett, of Exeter. Deceased was
one of the best known citizens of Huron
county, and it was through his munificence
that the beautiful Trivett Memorial Church
was erected a few years ago.

—The firemen were called out at noon
yesterday to attend a pile of burning tires
on the Port Stanley track at Hill street.
The origin of the fire is unknown to the
firemen, but it is thought that some small
boys down that direction may be able to
supply the needed information.

—Justin Hair's fondness for wheels has
got him into trouble. The wheels are not
pneumatic but belong to a road democrat,
and Martin Doxtator has sworn that
Justin stole them off his wagon while the
latter was on the highway near Strathburn.
Squire Lockwood, Delaware, committed
Mr. Hair for trial, and a constable brought
him into jail on Saturday night.

—The fame of the great Scottish gather-
ing at Port Stanley on Tuesday of next
week, has reached New York city. The
Scottish-American Journal says: "There
is to be a great Scotch gathering at Port
Stanley, Ont., at the end of this month
under the auspices of the Scottish
societies of London. Contingents are ex-
pected to be present from St. Thomas,
Westminster and other places."

—"Why do dogs bark so frequently on
bright, moonlight nights like these?" was
asked of a night watchman by a citizen
annoyed by the howlings of numerous can-
ine pets. The watchman, who is accom-
panied by a dog, replied that he has long
observed, declared that the moonlight
and the moon's position in the sky is the
ancient notion that dogs "bayed at the
moon" was erroneous. "It is not the
moon," said he, "but the quick-moving
shadow cast by trees and other moving
objects on a windy or gusty night that
alarm them. On nights when the moon is
low and the atmosphere still, though the
moon be at its full, there is little or no
barking heard."

—Mr. James Angus, of lot 10, con. 3,
West Nissouri, a sturdy pioneer of the
township, died yesterday, aged 82. The
news will be heard regretfully throughout
the county, where his long residence and
personal merits made him widely and
favorably known. Mr. Angus was born in
Aberdeen, Scotland, and came to Canada
when young, locating first in Toronto and
then on his farm in Nissouri, then in its
primeval forest state. His wife, four sons
and four daughters mourn him. The sons
are: John and Samuel, of Manitoba; James,
at home, and Robert, mechanical superin-
tendent of E. Leonard & Sons' establish-
ment, London. The late pioneer was in
religious preference a Baptist and was a
man of sterling character.

The steam barge Juno arrived at Port
Stanley Saturday with a load of coal from
Lorraine, Ohio, for the L. E. and D. R. R.
Captain Allen reports that during a gale at
5 o'clock p.m. Friday, when twenty miles
south of Rondeau he encountered a sailing
yacht with five men aboard, helplessly
adrift. The sails were all down, and the
crew apparently trusting to the mercy of
wind and wave. They very thankfully ac-
cepted the proffered assistance of Captain
Allen, who kindly towed them to Rondeau
harbor. The captain did not learn their
names, but the party said they were from
London, two being teachers and one a
doctor. They had sailed from Owen Sound
and were bound for Port Dover when the
storm mastered them. From the descrip-
tion given, it is certain that one was
Principal Merchant, of the Collegiate In-
stitute, and another Mr. C. B. Edwards, of
Waterloo street school, who both left
the city for Owen Sound to enjoy
yachting en route. But for the Juno's
appearance their craft might have found-
ered.

Chinese Laundry Tickets.

Probably not one person in a thousand
understands the true interpretation of the
Chinese laundry ticket. The celestial has
a system of their own. It is based
on the many gods and goddesses of the
laundry. Although the system is a very
complicated one, seldom does a Chinese
laundress deliver a package of washing
to the wrong person. The Chinese laund-
man at the beginning of each week makes
out a batch of checks, in duplicate, to be
used as wash tickets. He selects the
name of some god or goddess, or
of some object, as the sun, the moon
or the stars.

"Moon, No. 2," and so on. In the space
between the two legends—for the signs are
repeated twice—he has his own name, as
for instance, "Wah Lee." When a cus-
tomer takes a bundle of washing to the
laundry the Chinese, first tearing a ticket
in two in a rapid fashion, puts one-half
on the package for reference, the other half
he gives as a receipt to the person who has
brought the package of laundry. It must
