THE HANGMAN

Well Provided With Poison.

The Discovery Made by Accident-Statement of Doctor Who Made the Autopsy.

Butler, Pa., Feb. 4.-Had Ed. Biddle failed in his plan to escape from the Allegheny county jail, he was prepared to cheat the hangman and most likely would have done so. This discovery has been made accidentally by Mrs. Mary Redd, who lives in Butler, and whose son, Thomas Redd, was in the jail at the time. The Biddles' clothing that they wore when captured, was packed for shipment to Pittsburg. Redd managed to secure a piece of the strap on the back of Ed. Biddles trousers, which he carried home as a souvenir and turned over to his mother. Mrs. Redd ripped the strap open and found within a pill which physicians examined and declared to contain enough strychnine to have killed two or three men.

REMINISCENCE OF JOHN. A year ago last fall Detective Chas. A. Mahoney, of Windsor, arrested John Biddle on a dredge in the river at Amherstburg, on a charge of stealing a watch from a widow living near Watford, Lambton county. The dredge was in the middle of the river and the detective came alongside in a tug-"Help me aboard," shouted the detective. A man's head and shoulders appeared over the side of the dredge and a hand was extended to the officer, who clambered up on deck. looking for a man named John Biddle," said the officer. "I'm your party," answered the man who had helped Mahoney on board. "Well, I've got a warrant for you, and you're my pris-oner," and the officer grabbed Biddle by the arm. "Well, what a fool I was to help you up here," observed Biddle, appreciating the grim humor of the situation. Biddle was taken to Windsor, but the detective says that the prisoner's brother-in-law, a well-known man in Detroit, came over and effected a settlement, which was made easy by the fact that the woman from whom the watch was stolen was too ill to appear in court.

RESULTS OF THE AUTOPSY. The evidence secured by the autopsy dies intended to kill themselves rather than be taken alive, and that Ed succeeded in his attempt, while Jack failed though life was forfeited. Dr Bicker gave the following statement. HAD NINE WOUNDS.

"Jack Biddle was the worst shot of the two men, although he was in better condition than Ed. when the men were brought to the jail on Friday night. He had two gunshot wounds on the right side in the region of the liver, bullets passing up and around the body, but doing no damage. They were removed on Saturday. A bullet wound was found in the roof of the mouth, but it was slight and would not have caused death. This wound was inflicted by himself with the evient intention of committing suicide. His right aim was shattered by five bullet wounds and the radius broken in the upper third. The wound that caused his death was made by a 41.75 News in a Nutshell. calibre bullet that passed through the crest of the illium on the right side and passed back through the kidney, causing hemorrhage.

"In all, Jack was suffering from nine wounds, but excepting the one that penetrated the kidney none of them would have been fatal.

A FATAL SHOT. Ed's terrible sufferings were caused by a bullet wound that struck him on the left breast about an inch and a half to the right of the nipple and passed down between the fourth and fifth ribs to the left of the heart and through the lungs. This wound was made by Ed himself, the powder marks being visible on the skin. Death was the use of the M. C. Another wound found on his body was on the same side about an inch from the left nipple, but the bullet struck the fourth rib, passed under the skin and did no damage. Both bullets found in Ed were 32-calibre, and in the opinion of the doctors who held the

autopsy there is no doubt that he killed ALL SHOT! At the coroner's inquest, Deputy Hoon, in describing the fight with the Biddles, said: "We put our two teams in charge of J. A. Snyder. We then got in line, and they came down hill, and the first thing I saw was Ed Biddle pulling a revolver. When he

pulled the gun all began to shoot. could not tell who fired the first shot. We all shot. I should judge we were 150 feet from them. They both fell on the sled. McGovern and I walked up to them. They were both lying on their faces. I walked up first, and McGovern swore at me for it. I had a revolver in my hand, and had it loaded. I walked up to them, and McGovern walked up and hit Jack on the back of the head with the butt end of his Winchester when he was on his face. Then I turned Ed over on his back. The bodies were in black caskets. The heads of the boys were turned so that the crowd could see them at a glance and the police kept the crowd moving all the time. The procession kept up throughout the three hours. The burial will take place tomorrow in one large grave in Calvary Cemetery. It is not likely that any religious services will be per-


