Rev. D. R. Drummond Leaves
St. Thomas for Hamilton—
No Change at Glencoe.

A meeting of the Presbytery of Lon-
don was held yesterday at Knox
Church, St. Thomas, the principal
business before it being the considera-
tion of calls extended to two members
of the presbytery.

Rev. D. R. Drummond, of St.
Thomas, the present moderator of the
presbytery, was the recipient of one
of the calls, which came from St.
Paul's Presbyterian Church, Hamil-
ton. A deputation from Hamilton
appeared to prosecute the call, which
was opposed by a deputation from Mr.
Drummond's present charge, Mr.

Drummond, however, decided to accept
the call, which was ratified by the
presbytery. The farewell sermon will
be preached by Mr. Drummond on the
second Sunday in February, after
which arrangements will be made both
for his induction at Hamilton by the
Hamilton Presbytery and for the fill-
ing of the vacancy at St. Thomas.

Another call before the presbytery
came from the Dovercourt Road
Church, Toronto, to Rev. Mr. Wilson,
pastor of Glencoe. A deputation ap-
peared to prosecute the call, which
was opposed by the congregation at
Glencoe. The entire matter was dis-
posed of, however, by Mr. Wilson de-
ciding to remain in his present charge.

Deputation From W. C. T. U. to
Appear in Regard to the
License Reduction.

There was a large attendance at the
semi-monthly meeting of the W. C. T. U.
in Somerset Hall last night. The
president, Mrs. D. A. McDermid, was in
the chair. The first matter to be con-
sidered was the subject of parlor-mee-
tings, which was introduced by Mrs.
Armstrong. The city is to be divided

Another large deputation was ap-
pointed to wait upon the city council
on the evening of Monday, Feb. 6, to
speak in behalf of the reduction of li-
censes. An invitation is extended to all
friends of the temperance cause to ac-
company the deputation.

Mrs. (Rev.) George Brown, of Toron-
to, presided at the meeting, and con-
ducted a special prayer service, the
subject of which was "Our Country
and the Election."

ENGINEER MAD,
TRAIN RUNS AWAY

Fireman Fights to Subdue Him
While Heavy Freight Goes
at Terrific Speed.

Carnegie, Pa., Jan. 25.—With an en-
gineer, suddenly gone mad holding
the throttle, and his fireman fight-
ing desperately to get control and
stop the runaway, a Pittsburgh, Cin-
cinnati and St. Louis freight train ran
miles an hour, expecting a wreck
momentarily, the train crew clung to
the cars unable to reach the engine.
While pulling his fast freight train
out of Coilers, W. Va., this afternoon,
Engineer Charles Kull became mad
and fought with his fireman Perry Mc-
Kinley, who struggled to subdue him
and check the fearful speed which had
been attained before McKinley dis-
covered the condition of his engineer.

The battle lasted almost the entire
30 miles between Coilers and this
place, and both the engineer and fire-
man were exhausted when the train
was brought to a standstill here.

Kull was turned over to Dr. R. L.
Taylor, who examined him, and later
had him confined in the West Penn-
sylvania Hospital, in Pittsburgh, where
his sanity will be examined into to-
morrow.

The ride shattered the nerves of all
the trainmen. The forward brakeman
tried to get to the engine when he saw
wrong, but could not stand on the
running boards. As the train whizzed
through Burgetstown the operator
telegraphed ahead to clear for a run-
away.

Kull has been known as one of the
best young engineers on the road, but
last Saturday received a fearful
shock at Coilers, W. Va., where a
switch failed to work and his engine
left the train hanging over a bluff. It
is thought this shattered his mind.

NO DISSOLUTION
UNLESS BEATEN

The British Government Intends
to Remain in Office for
the Present.

London, Jan. 24.—Home Secretary
Akers-Douglas, speaking at Dover to-
night, announced that unless the Gov-
ernment should be defeated, there will
be no dissolution of Parliament. The
Government, he said, has no intention
of making an appeal to the country
till the end of their term of office.

London, Jan. 24.—War Secretary
Arnold-Forster, speaking at Croydon
tonight, expressed the sympathy of
the people of the United Kingdom with
those of Russia. He said he was sure
Britons desired the peasants of Rus-
sia to enter upon the heritage of lib-
erty and freedom which all Britons
enjoyed and obtained through the
sacrifice of their forefathers.
