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LONDONER IN WINNIPEG

Mr. George Rowntree Sees Many Changes in Western City.

Mr. George Rowntree of South London, was in Winnipeg on Saturday, and here's what the Telegram of that city says:

"Mr. Rowntree has watched the development of the Canadian West very closely, and is deeply interested in the progress of Winnipeg and Manitoba. On Feb. 10, 1882, he paid a visit to this city, arriving here about 8 or 9 o'clock in the evening."

"I could not get a day in any of the hotels, then," he declared, "to a reporter yesterday, 'and was forced to sleep under a piano in the parlor of a hotel. The morning I remember throwing the water out of the back door on to a pile of frozen tea leaves and ice, very nearly equal in height to the first story of the hotel. When I went to the office to get a letter I was surprised to find about 200 men waiting outside the building. I had to fall back and get into line, and I took over an hour to get the communication I was after. At that time I noticed particularly the ox-carts used by the Indians to haul wood into Winnipeg."

"Things are changed now," continued Mr. Rowntree, "and this time I have a complete hotel accommodation. Only those who saw Winnipeg in the old days can fully appreciate the marvelous strides the city has made. In my opinion, you have some of the finest wholesale buildings in the world right here. It would appear to many, in fact, there are too many wholesale structures for the size of the city, but this is not the case when the fact is taken into consideration that Winnipeg is the commercial center of the whole west."

Mr. Rowntree had high praise for

the city's progress and the quality of its buildings.

He also mentioned the excellent public works and the high standard of living in the city.

He concluded by saying that he was very much impressed by the rapid growth and development of Winnipeg and Manitoba.
