Drunkard's Children **Get Big Damages**

Chicago, Jan. 12. - Damages in \$17,500 were awarded by a jury yesterday to the children of a drunken father for redress against the saloonkeepers, alleged to have made a drunkard of him. The verdict, establishing a precedent which will result in the institution of many similar suits, was rendered in Judge Richard S. Tuthill's court. The plaintiffs were the five children of John Hedlund, and the defendants, Oscar Geyer, Louis Lundquits and Ernest Thoren, saloonkeepers. The verdict is against them separately and
