LIBERALS ARE MAKING HEADWAY

Candidates in the West Speak
Hopefully of Results.

MEETINGS IN SEVERAL RIDINGS

Prominent Speakers Will Deliver Addresses—What the Candidates Are Doing.

The political campaign is now in its last stages, and from every Liberal candidate in Western Ontario come the most encouraging reports. There is no evidence of a slump in any constituency, and instead of losing, it is more than probable that the Liberals will gain seats.

East Lambton.

The riding of East Lambton is the scene of a great fight between Dr. C. O. Fairbank, the Liberal candidate, and the former member, Mr. J. E. Armstrong. Dr. Fairbank is a hard worker, and is doing magnificent service. He has covered the southern section of the riding, addressing large meetings at every point. This week he will visit the north part, and will address several meetings. During the last week of the campaign, he will remain in Petrolia and Enniskillen, where his large business interests are located.

Dr. Fairbank is making splendid gains in the outlying portions of the riding. The townships of Bosanquet, Warwick, Brooke and Euphemia will increase their Liberal majorities, and will send him to Petrolia and Enniskillen with a good majority. Petrolia and Enniskillen have been in the past strongly Conservative, owing to the protection of the oil industry, but when it was stated that the Liberals came into power the oil industry would be ruined. Instead of ruining that industry, it is in a better position than for years, and there is a considerable revision of feeling in favor of the Liberal candidate. Dr. Fairbank is the son of Mr. J. H. Fairbank, ex-M. P., and one of the most popular men in Lambton County. He is putting up a great campaign, and is meeting with much encouragement.

South Oxford.

A very strenuous campaign is being waged in South Oxford, where Mr. M. C. Schell, the Liberal candidate, is being opposed by Mr. Donald Sutherland, ex-M. P. P. The Conservatives have

made a dead set on this riding, but so far with little success. Mr. Sutherland does not command the united support of the Conservatives in the riding, and as a result his candidature is not being supported by the party as a whole. Mr. Schell, on the other hand, is a strong candidate and is backed by the solid phalanx of Liberalism. He has made ground during the past two weeks, and will probably be returned with a substantial increase in major- ity.

Wheat Crop 115,651,000 Bushels

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—The following statement on the estimated yield and quality of crops in Canada is given out by the census and statistics office. The returns are based upon actual threshing results so far as these have been obtained. The average yield of wheat is estimated at 17½ bushels per acre, indicating a total production of 115,651,000 bushels; oats, 33.7 bushels per acre, total production, 267,651,000 bushels; barley, 29.9 bushels per acre, total production, 1,859,000 bushels.

The yield of wheat, as estimated from the condition of the crops at the end of August, is not maintained by

the present threshing results, the total yield of wheat as now estimated being 3½ bushels per acre less or a diminution in the total production as then estimated of 9,039,000 bushels, but the drop is almost entirely due to the returns from the provinces of Saskatchewan and Manitoba, where climatic influences appear to have had greater effect upon the yield than were indicated by the appearance of the crops at the end of August.

In Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta the estimated yield of wheat is 35,818,000 bushels; of oats, 105,481,000 bushels, and of barley, 24,362,000 bushels.

North Bay Menaced by Bad Blaze

North Bay, Oct. 11.—A fire broke out this morning about 2 o'clock on McIntyre street, destroying the Atlantic Hotel and several adjoining residences. There were no fatalities. Dr. McMurray and his wife had to be awakened after their house was on fire, being evidently stupefied by the smoke.

The water supply was poor and it seemed for a time that the fire might destroy a great part of the town. Fortunately there was no wind. A slight rainfall aided the exertions of the fire department. The loss was about \$12,000. Insurance about half that amount.

Close Fights in the North Ridings

Wingham, Oct. 10.—There is plenty of interest in the election contests in this immediate vicinity. In East Huron, Mr. Kilgob, the Liberal candidate, is expected to redeem the riding. Canvassers who have returned to town from the rural districts report that they never saw the Liberals more determined, and local Liberal workers in this town have more heart than for many years. Dr. Chisholm, the Conservative candidate, is also popular here in his own town. Last election the Liberals were not enthusiastic. This time they are united and enthusiastic.

In South Bruce, the fight is warm. The Liberal member, Mr. P. MacKenzie, has had some differences with

some of the party in Teeswater and Culcross. It is reported that these have been patched up, and that everything is O. K. again. The chances are in favor of his re-election.

Reports from North Bruce are that John Toimie, Liberal, will have something like a walk-over.

In West Huron Robert Holmes, editor of the Clinton News Era, who sat in parliament for one term, and E. N. Lewis, member in last parliament, are both out on a still-hunt, and it is hard to tell who will win. Lewis split with his party on the Northwest school question, probably figuring that it will not hurt him with the Orangemen, and that it will help him with the Ashfield Township Catholics.

MURPHY, SWORN-IN.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—Hon. Chas. Murphy took the oath of allegiance as secretary of state before Sir Charles Fitzpatrick on a Douay Bible today at noon.
