## BETTER THAN DREADNOUGHT

Toronto Drygoods Merchant Approves New Trade Agreement With Germany.

Toronto, Feb. 23.—W. R. Smallpiece was elected chairman of the wholesale drygoods section of the board of trade yesterday. Mr. John D. Ivey, the retiring chairman, in the course of his address, said in part:

"The French treaty came into force on Feb. 1 last, and carries with it the provision that all goods are to be imported via Canadian ports. This prohibits the importer from taking advantage of the steamship service heretofore enjoyed. As there is practically only one mailing day a week to Canadian ports, and the ships are of comparatively small tonnage, it has been impossible, especially in the winter months, for the steamships to carry the cargoes offered, it being a common thing for a part of the cargo to be refused, and left on the docks at Liverpool. This is a condition which should be remedied, and a question which could be well kept in mind by the section."

"It has lately been announced that the surtax on German goods is to be withdrawn on March 1. I cannot but feel that this is a step in the right direction, and while it may not be just in order, I should like to say that I read with much interest a statement made by a member of the section to the press, that the withdrawal of the German surtax and a closer commercial relationship with Germany at this time was of more value to the empire than the building of additional Dreadnoughts."

## PREMIER'S ILLNESS IS NOT SERIOUS

Emphatic Denial to Story That Sir Wilfrid Suffers From Throat Trouble

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—An emphatic denial is given to the story sent out to the effect that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's illness is of a serious nature. Sir Wilfrid has been suffering for some days from an attack of la grippe, from which he is now practically recovered. He was able yesterday morning, and as a matter of fact has been able all along, to attend to his correspondence as usual, dictating a large number of letters to his private secretary. Sir Wilfrid's physician has advised him that it would be better for him to remain in the house for a couple of days, and as there is nothing going on in the House which necessitates his presence there for the next day or two, he is taking this advice, and does not expect to be out till Thursday.

Not Throat Trouble. There is no truth whatever in the report that Sir Wilfrid is suffering from a throat affection, or that his facial muscles have been affected by his illness. Apart from the fact that Sir Wilfrid had a couple of colds, and one occasion was incapacitated by toothache, he has been in good health this session. If he remains indoors until entirely free from the indisposition of la grippe, there is no reason to believe that he will not continue in good health.

The Premier in recent sessions has shown some disposition to save himself more than when he was younger, and does not sit in the House so much when it is in supply, or attending routine business. In this course he is encouraged by his colleagues, who are quite able to keep the parliamentary machinery going.

## WESTINGHOUSE GETS ST. THOMAS CONTRACTS

Tenders for Powerhouse Equipment Go to Hamilton Firm.

St. Thomas, Feb. 23.—The tenders of the Canadian Westinghouse Company, of Hamilton, for the entire equipment of the powerhouse in connection with the hydro-electric commission, to include transformers and all machinery in the station, which would be directed to all uses incidental to the storage and distribution of electricity, were accepted by the power committee yesterday.

There were three offers, the figures being: Canadian General Electric, \$19,515; Laneshire Dynamo Motor Company, \$18,447; and Canadian Westinghouse Company, \$18,170. Tenders for wires and poles will be asked for later. It was decided to get a line man at \$18 a week, and this place was given to Mr. Roberts, of the light, heat and power department. Chairman Price and City Engineer Bell located the route yesterday on which the main lines will be placed in the city for the transmission of power and heat. There will be 651 tungsten lamps installed and 49 arcs.

## CLERGY IN NAVAL FIGHT

Said to Have Taken Stand Against Scheme of Government.

Montreal, Feb. 23.—The French Catholic clergy, or at least two of them, have thrown themselves into the fight against the Laurier naval programme. At high mass Sunday morning at St. Anne de la Paroisse, and at Ste. Ursule, the cure denounced the pulp it after the mass and announced that they had blank petitions against the naval bill, and asking for a reference of the matter to the people. They urged their parishioners to come into the vestry after the service and sign them.

At Ste. Ursule, Cure Olivier announced that "Canada would have to pay fifteen millions to build the ships, and three millions a year after that to keep them, and asked his people if they were going to stand for that. A large number signed the petition in the sacristy after the mass."

## GLASGOW STUDENTS FORCE CURZON OUT

Glasgow, Feb. 23.—Lord Curzon, of Kedleston, has resigned the rectorship of Glasgow University. Last week the university students held a meeting and adopted a resolution of censure against Lord Curzon, the lord rector, for postponing his installation ceremony in favor of his political engagements. Lord Curzon then sent a letter of explanation, whereupon the students met again and adopted for the second time a vote of censure.

## LOCAL OPTION STANDS IN CHESLEY TOWN

Toronto, Feb. 23.—Chief Justice Meredith refused yesterday to prohibit the county judge of Bruce from certifying the result of his scrutiny of the recent Chesley local option vote. His lordship held that he had no jurisdiction. MacKay, K. C., M. P. P., appeared for the local optionists. As a result of the scrutiny the local option bylaw carries by one vote over the three-fifths.

## PROVINCE JOINS FIGHT

Unites With Toronto Against the H. G. and Waterloo Railway.

Toronto, Feb. 23.—The province of Ontario will join with the city authorities in the fight at Ottawa against the application of the Hamilton, Guelph and Waterloo Railway for permission to enter Toronto by means of a subway. The Whitney cabinet has decided that the question is a provincial one, and that it would be an invasion of provincial rights for the Dominion Government to grant such a charter as is asked, and Mr. H. L. Drayton, K. C., has been appointed to present the objections of the Provincial Government when the application is considered by the railway committee at Ottawa on Thursday.

## DECISION AS TO RATES

Railways Win in Appeal to the Supreme Court.

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—The supreme court yesterday gave judgment in the case of the City of Toronto v. The Grand Trunk and C. P. R. in connection with the commutation rates allowed by the railway companies to suburban points near the city. The city applied to the board of railway commissioners for an order forbidding the railway companies discriminating in passenger rates between Toronto and suburban points by allowing commutation tickets on some routes and not on others.

The majority of the court holds that on the stated case brought before it by decision of the board the companies have a right under section 241 of the railway act to issue a special rate to any point without giving similar rates to other points equally distant from the city. The court holds that this decision, however, only applied to the special case cited, and other cases must be dealt with on their merits. The case in question was with regard to commutation rates to Oakville and Brampton.

In vs. Berlin and Waterloo Railway Company, the appeal was allowed with costs.

## SPEYER BUYING STEEL

Noted English Financier on Important Business Trip to Canada.

Toronto, Feb. 23.—The Right Hon. Sir Edgar Speyer, Bart., representing Speyer & Co., bankers, London, Eng., arrived in Toronto yesterday. It is understood that his visit is for the purpose of buying Dominion Iron and Steel Company bonds.

It is significant of the importance of Canadian finance in the eyes of the world to see an international banking house sending a representative to Canada in order to purchase Canadian securities. The distinguished visitor will address the Canadian Club on international finance on Feb. 28.

Sir Edgar Speyer was brought prominently before the public last fall, when he was made a privy councillor, but he is more particularly known to the Canadian public through his part in the financing of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Dominion Iron and Steel companies. He is not only the head of one of the biggest banking firms in the world, but is an artist, big-hearted man, who gave \$25,000 to King Edward's hospital fund. He was made a baronet in 1906.

## COSTLY TORONTO FIRE

Toronto, Feb. 23.—Fire tonight in the building at 8 Adelaide street west, caused damage aggregating \$30,000, divided as follows: Art Wall Paper Company, \$20,000; T. W. Capp Company, \$2,000; J. E. Bruner, \$2,000; G. F. Glasco, \$1,000; and Eyrle Bros., the owners of the building, \$6,000. The loss is mostly covered by insurance.

## BIG FIRE IN HEART OF TOWN OF IROQUOIS

Half a Dozen Stores and Several Residences Destroyed in Conflagration Saturday.

Iroquois, Feb. 23.—Iroquois has again been visited by a destructive fire. Very early yesterday morning fire was discovered in the residence of Mrs. Gordon Serviss, King street, east of the postoffice.

This block contained, besides the residence of Mrs. Serviss, her millinery establishment and the drug store of the late Mr. Serviss. These are completely destroyed, and nothing saved. Mrs. Serviss was in Toronto at the millinery opening.

The fire spread west to Mr. W. N. Abbott's residence, grocery store and livery. These were also completely destroyed. Mr. Abbott's horses were taken out, but his rigs were burned, with a quantity of hay and grain.

The fire spread east to the adjoining building, the Jacob Ross block, owned by Mr. Serviss, and occupied by C. C. Munro as a feed store and implement building, of the Deering Harvester Company. These were destroyed, together with the vacant residence in the same block. Mr. Munro had his horse burned and four new buggies, with a cutter and harness and machinery.

The whole loss is estimated at \$10,000; partly covered by insurance.

## NEW POLICE CHIEF

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—At the meeting of the police commissioners yesterday afternoon the resignation of Chief De la Ronde was accepted, and the assistant inspector Alex. M. Ross was appointed. The commissioners in the resolution referred to De la Ronde's earnest endeavors to faithfully and efficiently discharge his duties.

The resignation follows an inquiry in military circles, being a director of the O. A. A. C.

## SUICIDE AND INSURANCE.

Toronto, Feb. 23.—The present law with regard to the liability of an insurance company for a policy if the holder commits suicide, and the Attorney-General will introduce an amendment during this session that will settle the point. The change will provide that where a policy is "incontestable and indisputable" death by suicide shall not constitute a reason for the company discharging payment. This, of course, will prevent the issuing of policies where death by suicide is mentioned specifically. The law in the United States favors the company in this respect, and many believe that the law in Ontario is in a case tried in Toronto one year ago the company was forced to pay, but the jury decided that there had not been a suicide.

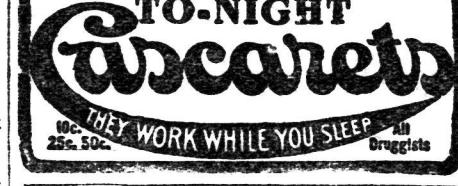
