# FATAL "VENUS" MAY WIN FREEDOM THROUGH NEW LOVER

Countess Tarnowski, Renowned for Beauty: Scandal and Crime, Hopes for Escape Murderer's Cell and From Cruel Punishment by Aid of Russian Duke.

[Special Correspondence.]

Venice, Italy, Oct. 11 .- Countess Tarnowski, the beautiful and wicked "Venus of Venice," may soon be freed from prison by a royal parcon. She has served only two years of her eight-year sentence for the murder of her lover, Count Paul Kamarovsky.

A wealthy Russian Duke, who first saw her during the trial, became infatuated with her rare beauty, like so many others, and he has since lived near the prison, praying and working for her pardon. His influence is reported to be responsible for the king's contemplated action.

The duke has been spurred on by knowledge of the brutal treatment of the countess. In her isolated cell there is only a small table, a stool and a wooden couch, or sleeping shelf.

Italian prison rules say that convicts must rise promptly at 6 o'clock in the morning; if they remain on the couch a minute longer they are severely punished. So, no matter how tired she is of standing in that lonesome cell, or how her back aches from sitting on the wooden stool, whether sick or well, the countess cannot lie on the wooden bed during the day-

The murder was committed in 1 07. The countess, Naumoff and Prilukeff were arrested shortly afterwards, and all three confessed.

In this way the blood vessels become engorged and are weakened, the scalp is overheated, the hairs die and fall out, and the scalp becomes thin and

Over-swinging is a much more common fault among ladies then among men, I have never been able to find out why this should be. I know of one club in which almost all the members swing so far around that it seems surprising that the club head ever gets back to the ball at all, and the swing for a short approach is as long as for the drive of most players. This may or may not be the fault of the professional who instructed the members Perhaps their best player habitually over swung and the other members followed suit by the imitation, which is upposed to be the sincerest form of flattery. Be that as it may, it is a dangerous fault and one that will cos its possessor many and many a game Another grave mistake is to be indifferent as to whether the ball is extricated from a hazard in one, two or more strokes. The moral effect of wasting several shots in this way is great, especially in a medal round, and although it is exhausting work practicing getting out of bunkers, it certainly repays the player who makes the effort.
