During the past week the fans have had a chance to get acquainted with Manager Albert V. Barrett, of the London team, and the stamp of approval has been placed upon him. There is a large difference between the methods of Barrett and Bowerman. Where Bowerman was loud and boisterous, Barrett is mild and calm. He is in the game all the time and watches every move of his players, but he does not use the methods by which Bowerman became unpopular. He has his own ideas of pointing out a player's faults,

and for this reason alone he has become popular with the fans and players alike. Manager Barrett was until three years ago a star pitcher. He spent his summers playing ball, and

was a member of the Trenton and Reading teams in the Tri-State League. He was one of the best the Tri-State League. He was one of the best twirlers that the Tri-State League ever turned out, and silent old Connie Mack, who, has been accused of kidnapping youngsters from the cradles of the minors and developing them into real ball players, had already east his eye upon him. In 1909 Mack drafted Barrett, and the latter was to report for the training trip of 1910. However, an accident occurred before that time that dashed Barrett's hopes of ever breaking into the big league. He was showing a catcher how to throw to second base one soggy day at Niagara University, and while making the throw with his arm cold, he tore a cartilage in his arm. The injury was a serious one, and it practically put Barrett out of the game for good as a pitcher. 
