The attack on the resolution was made by W. S. Dingman, editor and proprietor of the Stratford Herald. He wanted the whole resolution struck out, and one substituted which would pledge the conference to the abolition of the bar, provided that "this conference does not judge the consciences of individuals as to their choice of methods to attain this end." His resolution added that "respect must

be paid to varying opinions of honest men on a difficult question, so long as the pursuit of the objective is sincere, hearty and sustained.'

Mr. Dingman said he must protest against any resolution which would appear to place one party ahead of another. He said there was an element in the Conservative party that had no identification with the liquor traffic. Sir James Whitney's party included men who were prominent Methodists. 
