NAVAL BATTLE OFF PORT OF ODESSA

Turkish and Russian Fleets Reported Engaged—Czar's Gunboat Sunk.

TURKS NEAR THE RED SEA

According to Dispatches Russia's Losses Are Very Heavy.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—10:35 p.m.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Rome says:

"It is reported from Constantinople that a battle between Turkish and Russian fleets is in progress off Odesa. The Russian gunboat Donets was sunk, a part of the crew was drowned and the others were killed or wounded by the Turkish torpedo-boats, which yesterday raided the port of Odesa, according to a message to Lloyd's Agency. The Russian steamers Lazarev, Wittke and Whampoa, and the French steamer Poros, were damaged by shell fire, and a number of sailors were killed or wounded.

Shells were also fired on the suburbs of Odesa near a number of oil tanks, but the latter were undamaged. A sugar factory, however, was hit, some civilians also were killed or injured by the shells.

Fleet Leaves Black Sea?
Strong Turkish cavalry divisions are said to have arrived in the neighborhood of the Gulf of Akabah, on the Red Sea, about 200 miles south of the Suez Canal, and the entire Turkish fleet is reported to have left the Black Sea.

This news was contained in a Cairo dispatch received in Vienna and forwarded to London by the correspondent at Amsterdam of the Central News Agency.

Bedouins Are Missing.
There have been great manifestations at Damascus, in Asiatic Turkey, in favor of a war against Christians, and especially against Great Britain, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Athens.

The missing of Bedouins along the Egyptian frontier, the dispatch adds, is being continued.

Alleged Turkish Report.
AMSTERDAM, Oct. 30.—6:03 p.m., via London.—The Berlin newspaper Zeitung-Am-Neue publishes today what purports to be an official communication from Constantinople. It states: "Turkish torpedo-boats attempted to prevent the Turkish fleet leaving the Bosphorus and steaming to the Black Sea. Thirteen Turkish ships opened fire, and sank three Russian vessels. More than thirty Russian sailors, saved by the Turks, were made prisoners. The Turkish fleet sustained no losses."

The Handelsblatt says it has learned from Berlin that the Turkish fleet entered the Black Sea on October 28, and that minor engagements followed. Turkish scouts, with wireless outfits, are said to have appeared at the entrance of the Gulf of Suez.

According to the same advice, Turkish living in neutral countries have been ordered to present themselves to their consuls.

Says Russians Interfered.
BERLIN, via The Hague to London, Oct. 30.—8:40 p.m.—One version of the fighting in the Black Sea between Russian torpedo-boats, which were attempting to prevent the Turkish fleet from steaming through the Bosphorus to the Black Sea, is that four Russian gunboats and one torpedo-boat were sunk by the Turks.

Think Outlook Serious.
ROME, Oct. 30.—12:15 p.m.—Turkey's attack on Russia without a declaration of war is causing a serious impression, as it is generally taken to mean a further extension of the war, and also its indefinite prolongation.

On the request of the Russian Government the Italian Government has instructed the ambassador of Italy at Constantinople to protect Russian subjects and interests.

WILD GEESSE PLENTIFUL

GERMANY HAS THE WORLD BY THE NECK FROM HER OWN TALK

Berlin Reports Indicate That British, Russian, Belgian and Servian People Are Lucky To Be Allowed to Breathe.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—8:40 p.m.—The following dispatch from Berlin was received here tonight by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company:

"Dunkirk is still preparing for a state of siege. In the event of a German advance, the whole neighborhood town of Dunkirk, upon which several German aviators have dropped bombs, increased. Gen. De Wet is at the head of the insurrection in the Orange Free State, and Gen. Beyers in the Western Transvaal. The Boers have imprisoned many Englishmen."

"The inhabitants of London are showing a capital for Scotland. The banks in Cairo, Egypt, have suspended business. The Anglo-French fleet has been recalled from the Mediterranean."

U. S. A. TO PROTEST KROONLAND DETENTION

Wants to Know Why Vessel Is Held—Considers It Unjust.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The state department has decided to protest to Great Britain against the detention of the American steamship Kroonland, held up at Gibraltar with some 1,200 passengers and a cargo of copper, bound from New York for Italian and Greek ports.

The British authorities will be asked whether the vessel is held because of the nature of her cargo, which has been declared conditional contraband, or because German and Austrian reservists are among her passengers. Full information concerning the case is lacking, but upon the facts in hand the state department officials take the position that the ship should either be released or taken forthwith into a prize court.

Think Seizure Unjust.

It was pointed out tonight that the Kroonland sailed from New York ten days before Great Britain added copper to the list of conditional contraband and made no stop en route to Gibraltar, and therefore should not be subject to seizure on account of her cargo.

So far no official communication has been received concerning the reported detention of the Italian steamers San Giovanni and Regina d'Italia, but as they carry American copper cargoes the state department probably will protest also against their detention at Gibraltar, as they are billed to Italian ports.

Trust Italy's Fairness.

ROME, Oct. 30.—11:30 a.m.—Several incidents caused by the capture of British and French warships of Italian steamships suspected of carrying contraband, especially from the United States to Austria and Germany have been solved satisfactorily as a result of the friendly attitude adopted by the French Foreign Minister, Théophile Delcasse.

In most cases the confiscated steamers have later been returned to Italy, it being left to Italian fair-play to decide whether the Italian vessels had violated the neutrality regulations.

INCREASED TAX FOR MOTOR CARS

Government May Add Dollar Per Horsepower—Money For Road Work.

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—It is understood that when the Legislature meets this winter a bill will be enacted to increase the tax on automobiles to \$1 per horsepower on all high power machines, as a means of increasing the revenue of the Government.

This is said to have been rendered necessary by the expenditure involved in road building schemes. The building of the Toronto-Hamilton road has created a problem for the Government.

Much private money is being advanced to tide the treasury over until bonds can be floated on the provincial guarantee. It is expected that other sections of the country will undertake similar works in the near future, and these will have to be assisted to the same extent as the Toronto-Hamilton undertaking.

LINER LUSITANIA IS SAFE

Will Reach Ambrose Channel Lightship This Morning.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—A wireless message was received tonight at the office of the Cunard Line, stating that the captain of the steamship Lusitania, stating that his vessel would reach Ambrose Channel lightship about 8 o'clock tomorrow morning. The Lusitania should have docked this morning, and some anxiety was felt for her safety, as she had not been in wireless communication since leaving the other side.
