

REPARATIONS DEMANDS TO BE MET BY GERMANS

GERMANY IS EXPECTED TO YIELD TO ALLIED TERMS; COALITION WILL ACCEPT

France Will Not Call for Demobilization of Classes Called to Colors Until Convinced That All German States Have Disarmed—Doubt Exists as to Bavaria's Intentions.

Berlin, May 9.—Sentiment in German political circles was showing a drift at noon today in favor of agreeing to the Allied reparations terms. It is now believed a parliamentary coalition which will accept the Allied ultimatum, will be constituted within the next 24 hours.

FRENCH TROOPS WILL BE HELD UNTIL JULY

Paris, May 9.—The army contingent of 1913, called to the colors in connection with the preparations for the possible occupation of the Ruhr Valley, will in no case be sent home before July. It was said today in official circles. Even if the Germans accept the Allied ultimatum, the troops mobilized for the occupation will be held in readiness for action in case Bavaria does not disarm before June 30, the time limit fixed by the Allies for completion of the disarming process. It was stated.

DR. MAYER WILL NOT AGREE TO FORM MINISTRY

Berlin, May 9.—National committee-men of the Majority Socialist and Democratic parties gathered here today to discuss the attitude those organizations would take relative to the international situation resulting from the presentation of the Allied ultimatum regarding reparations. There was hope in some quarters that an agreement would be reached by the two parties to participate in the formation of a cabinet to succeed that of Constantine Fehrenbach, which resigned last week.

ENTRANCE OF GERMAN TROOPS INTO SILESIA BREACH OF TREATY

Paris, May 9.—A Berlin dispatch to the Matin says that the French ambassador in that city has informed the French foreign office that all incursions of German Government troops into Upper Silesia would be considered by France as a violation of the Versailles treaty. Advice from Berlin states that an offensive against the Poles, who have virtually taken over most of Upper Silesia, is being planned by the German civilian guards, which are being concentrated along the border.

FRANCE SENDS HER REPLY TO GERMANS

Paris, May 9.—France today replied to the note which Germany last week addressed to the Allies, in which the German government called to the Polish insurgent movement in Upper Silesia.

U. S. REPRESENTED AT ALLIED CONFERENCES

Henry Wallace Is Welcomed by Council of Ambassadors.

Paris, May 9.—United States representation at allied conferences was resumed today when Hugh C. Wallace, American ambassador, took his seat at a session of the council of ambassadors here.

Mr. Wallace received his instructions last night from Secretary of State Robert M. La Follette, who is in London to represent the United States Government at the ambassadorial conference.

The United States ambassador's appearance at the foreign office, which this morning was the occasion for warm expressions of appreciation on the part of Jules Cambon, of France, the president of the council, and the other members of the council, and Mr. Wallace was given a seat at Mr. Cambon's right.

SECRETARY OF LABOR EXPECTS REPORT ON MARINE MEN'S VOTE

Washington, May 9.—Formal report on the result of the vote taken by United States marine workers on acceptance of the terms submitted by the department of labor for settlement of the wage dispute was expected to be made to Secretary of Labor Davis today by representatives of the workers.

Social Service Council Delegates Claim Decided Improvement.

CONVENTION OPENS

Large Gathering at Peterboro for Annual Meeting.

Peterboro, May 9.—(Canadian Press).—Following the special church services in the city churches yesterday, where most of the local pupils were occupied by visiting delegates to the annual meeting of the Social Service Council of Ontario, the council today plunged into the work of the various business sessions of the meeting. The agenda calls for important reports of committees, recommendations and discussions dealing with the improvement of social conditions and child welfare throughout the province of Ontario. Right Rev. J. F. Sweeney, D.D., lord bishop of Toronto, is president, and Rev. Gilbert Agar is the permanent general secretary.

This morning was occupied largely with the registration of delegates, and this afternoon the convention was officially opened and welcomed by the local authorities and social service leaders. Rev. Dr. J. G. Shearer, D.D., general secretary of the Social Service Council of Canada, delivered an address.

Report is presented. The report of the motion picture and theatrical committee detailing the extensive work of that body in connection with the elimination of objectionable features from all classes of theatrical performances and movies as well as from billboards and lobby advertising, was presented. The committee reported a decided improvement in this connection, through its conferences with the official censoring boards of the Government. Also, a public meeting, especially directed towards lessening the display of knives and guns, and nudity, also of scenes of torture and violence, and scenes of religious leaders or religious work, Co-operation of Hon. Peter Smith, provincial treasurer, and his officials was commended by the committee, which asked for continuance and enlargement of its sphere of work.

London, May 9.—All classes of society in Bulgaria have been called upon to fulfill their civic duties under the provisions of the compulsory labor law, which was adopted a year ago. The law provided that men who had attained the age of 20 years, and girls who were 15 years old, were to be called on for a certain amount of compulsory labor for the state. Men were to work 12 months, and women 6 months, and none was allowed to emigrate until duties imposed had been performed.

ROYAL WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO JAPANESE PRINCE

Prince of Wales Escorts Visitor to Shore.

London, May 9.—Crown Prince Hirohito of Japan today began a three weeks' visit to Great Britain under most auspicious circumstances. He landed in Portsmouth Harbor this morning on the battleship Katsur, on which he came to England from Japan, being escorted to the shore by the Prince of Wales, British warships in the harbor thundered the royal salute when he left the deck of the battleship.

Following the arrival here, the prince proceeded to Buckingham Palace, where he will be the guest of King George and Queen Mary for several days. Announcement has been made that the crown prince has been made an honorary general of the British army.

During the next week, the royal visitor will visit points of historical interest in London and Southern England, and on May 19 will go to Edinburgh. He will return here later in the month, and will probably leave for France about June 1.

FULL HONORS EXTENDED

London, May 9.—The capital of the British Empire today accorded Prince Hirohito, heir-apparent to the Japanese throne, a tumultuous welcome upon his arrival here for a three-weeks' visit to England.

Full honors of state were extended to him, the occasion being the first for such honors to a visiting foreign dignitary since 1914. A bright spring day provided ideal weather for the reception. The Japanese "crown ambassador," accompanied by the Prince of Wales, arrived at Victoria station on a special train from Portsmouth. He was greeted with cordial handshakes by King George, the Duke of Connaught and the Duke of York. The brilliant suite of British officialdom in attendance stood at salute while the bands played the Japanese anthem.

WOULD ALLOW HEADS OF DEPARTMENT CHOOSE MEN FOR SERVICE

Ottawa, May 9.—The civil service commission has had so much work thrust upon it that a dozen supermen could not handle the work as satisfactorily as the deputy heads of departments, declared W. W. Cory, deputy minister of the interior department and immigration department, to the special committee on the Spinney bill this morning. There was too much delay in making appointments under the present act, and higher officials could be chosen better by heads of departments than by the commission. Ordinarily, clerical appointments in Ottawa could be handled satisfactorily under the commission.

WELFARE DRIVE GETS UNDER WAY

Teams Receive Instructions at Meeting This Morning.

FIRST REPORT ON WED.

Canvassers To Be Guests of George M. Reid at Dinner Tonight.

"Open Your Hearts and Your Purses" is the slogan printed in great white letters on innumerable heart-shaped signs posted throughout the city to show that all roads lead this week to the headquarters of the Welfare Fund Campaign in the local Chamber of Commerce, and the treasurer's office in the London and Western Trusts Building.

Today and on Tuesday the trails are being blazed. On Wednesday an intensive campaign will be begun. The Catholic Club, assisted by the Life Underwriters' Association and the Advertising Club, supplemented by forces from the Salvation Army, were the first organizations to send teams into the field. Early this morning the workers from the Catholic Club gathered in their headquarters in St. Peter's Hall, received their cards, literature and instructions, and started to work. At the same time the members of the Advertising Club received their instructions in the Chamber of Commerce.

The two organizations and their helpers are supplying 50 volunteer workers to help in the campaign. They have been divided into pairs, giving a total of 25 different teams, to canvass the stores, offices and banks in the business sections of the city. Although this morning, it is not expected that they will make heavy collections until Wednesday, when the real campaign will begin. Their first report will be made Wednesday night.

The teams from the Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs were given their final instructions at a luncheon in the Teacum House at noon today. The members of the teams started to canvass this morning. The canvassers and the different committees will be the guests of George M. Reid at a dinner tonight. The gathering will be addressed by Rev. W. A. Cameron of the Bloort Street Baptist Church, Toronto. Mr. Cameron has been actively engaged in welfare work in that city, and so it is expected that he will give an intensely interesting as well as instructive talk this evening.

In all probability the "A" teams, or those entered by a committee from the Chamber of Commerce, headed by J. J. Foote, will make a report on their work among the expected large contributors, who have been placed on a special list. This is the only report expected this evening.

JOHN DOUGHTY SENTENCED TO 6-YEAR TERM

Second Charge of Conspiracy To Kidnap May Be Dropped.

GUILTY OF STEALING

Convicted of Theft of \$105,000 in Victory Bonds.

Toronto, May 9.—John Doughty, who was convicted by a jury in the sessions on March 24 of the theft of \$106,000 worth of Victory bonds from Ambrose J. Small, the missing millionaire theatrical magnate, was sentenced this morning by Judge Denton to six years in the penitentiary. Following the passing of the sentence, Crown Prosecutor R. H. Greer informed the judge that the charge of conspiring to kidnap Small remains on the list.

I. F. Hellmuth, K.C., made a strong plea for leniency on the ground of the prisoner's previous good record and that he had informed the police where the bonds were hidden, and the Small estate had suffered no loss.

No Reason Why Men Should Not Agree To 30-Day Clause Declares President Currie



Representatives of Street Railway Men Notified of Receipt of Mr. Currie's Reply This Morning—Meeting of the Men's Executive Expected To Take Up the Matter Tonight.

"So far as the London Street Railway Company is concerned the situation stands just as it was," said Secretary-Treasurer L. Tait today in reply to an inquiry by The Advertiser. This statement followed the information that President Currie's reply to the letter sent by the street railway men's committee had been received. "In his letter," said Mr. Tait, "Mr. Currie states that he can see no reason at all why the men should not accept the 30-day clause in the proposed new agreement."

"This information was immediately given to Messrs. Colbert and Ashton," the men's representatives, and the next move, if any, now rests with the men.

It is understood that the executive committee of the men's union will meet tonight to consider the president's reply. At the last meeting of the men the executive was given full power to call a strike if the reply of Mr. Currie should prove unsatisfactory, but there is an impression that the executive will not make use of this prerogative without another consultation with the men.

PREMIERS INVITED TO SEE OPENING OF IRISH PARLIAMENT

London, May 9.—Canadian Associated Press.—Sir James Craig, the Ulster leader, speaking at a meeting at County Down, announced that he has taken steps, through the British colonial office, to invite the premiers of all the British overseas dominions to come to Belfast to witness the opening of the new parliament for the north of Ireland. They would witness a spectacle which would warm their hearts, said Sir James.

WRONG IMPRESSION GIVEN BY PREACHER, SAYS MRS. TANNER

ADVISES USE OF PEAT TO SAVE COAL

Government Expert Declares Canadian Supply Is Adequate.

Ottawa, May 9.—Canadian Press.—A thorough peat survey, which the geological survey informed the special parliamentary committee on Canada's fuel resources, this morning that there was no reason why Canadian peat should not replace coal for heating purposes throughout the Dominion. This would relieve the Canadian public of dependence on United States mines and would release all coal importations for industrial purposes. Peat had proved satisfactory for cooking and open grates and for furnaces during the fall and spring months. So far more than 37,000 square miles of peat bog had been discovered and should be developed. One ton and a half of peat would give as much heat as a ton of anthracite coal.

BUDGET SPEECH IS POSTPONED UNTIL TONIGHT

Sir Henry Drayton To Present New Tax Proposals.

Ottawa, May 9.—Canadian Press.—The promised budget speech will not be delivered until tonight. All arrangements had been made that Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, would begin his speech shortly after the House opened this afternoon, and that he would reach his taxation proposals by 3:45 o'clock. Apparently, when the arrangements were made, it was forgotten that Parliament was working on a day-light saving time, and an hour ahead of both Montreal and Toronto.

There was a possibility that the markets might still be open in these cities and there was further difficulty, it is understood, in regard to customs office hours at various points in the Dominion.

The matter was discussed at a meeting of the council this morning, and a decision was reached that the speech be delivered at tonight's sitting of the House.

Executions by Bolsheviki Are Quite Common

Stockholm, May 9.—Reports of wholesale executions by the Bolsheviki of participants in the recent Kronstadt uprising are contained in a private message from Helsingfors to the Tidningen today. These met with immediate denial, however, from the Bolsheviki agency here.

MAGISTRATE TELLS HOBOES WHERE TO FIND LOTS OF WORK

Eight Homeless Ones Charged With Trespassing On Railway Property.

Poured From Lips of Prisoners As They Trooped Out—Free.

Eight homeless hobo-faced Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett at 10 Carling street this morning, after confessing that they had walked on forbidden ground, viz., the G. T. R. and the C. P. R. properties, were directed to places where there were prospects of work being obtained.

Blackened by their encounters with coal smoke screens, they gave a spectator the impression that one was in a court below the Maison-Dixon line, Joseph Ellis, John Thompson, William Leitch and Carol Johnston all said "Guilty" in broad Scotch, and were told to stand aside. Charles Taylor then admitted that he had stolen a ride on the C. P. R. train, and the first two pleaded guilty. The third man merely evaded this question and smiled. The court asked him to plead.

"I'm dead," he said. "If he had all the ear-marks and face-marks of having been through the smoke, it was dead that he was guilty. The anxious eight were then lined up in single file to hear their fate.

"I'm going to discharge all you men 'this morning,'" declared the court. "Thank you, sir. Thank you, indeed," chorused the whole crowd.

"You can go now," the magistrate told them, and they were in the act of marching out of the room when they were told to stand back. They looked on their faces, one got the impression that they thought the court had decided to harden his heart and throw them all into the "hoose-gow."

"There was one thing I want to tell you," said the deputy magistrate. "There is some work I think on the Government highway at Lambeth and at Lucan."

"Thank you, sir," replied the mob as they hurried away.
