MUST PASS BYLAW BEFORE POLICE CAN **COMMENCE CLEAN UP**

ST. THOMAS, Sept. S.—Before the taff of the city police may proceed o prosecute or remove the frequenters of the area on the south side of the London and Port Stanley station a bylaw must first be passed by the council, directing the police to act. 
