

PEEL PICTURES TO BE SHOWN IN ART GALLERY AT FAIR

Four Subjects of the Famous
London Artist Coming
From Toronto.

DETROIT SENDS OTHERS

Some Concessionaires Have
Already Opened Booths
in Queen's Park.

Ten pictures from the National Art Gallery in Ottawa and four from the Art Institute of Detroit arrived at the Exhibition Grounds for posting in the Arts Building, and six Paul Peel pictures from Toronto are expected to arrive today. The titles of the latter are as follows: "Mother's Help," "Adoration," "Return of the Flock," "The Milkmaid's Dilemma," "The Intruder," and "Threshing Day."

Regarding the children's day, which will be held on Monday, September 12, Secretary A. M. Hunt, received word this morning from the shows and rides which are now at the Toronto Exhibition, stating that a special rate of admission for all rides and shows will be given to school children.

Information Bureau.
J. Watts, of the firm of Watt & Blackwell, has been appointed chairman of the committee who are looking after the interests of the children on Monday and at a meeting held this morning it was decided to appoint W. A. Martin in charge of the whole program and have him stationed at the information bureau all day Monday.

Arrangements have been made with all the different clubs and organizations of the city and a party of 50 men will be stationed all through the grounds to look after the children in a general way and see that they have a good time.

Children who may not receive tickets through their schools are requested to come to the fair in any event and they will receive free admission.

The secretary of the dog show will be stationed in the information bureau and he may be seen there or interviewed by telephoning 552.

Exhibitors are warned again that all exhibits must be in place on Saturday night so that everything will be in readiness for the opening day, Monday, September 12.

Worked Under Handicap.
Last night the staff at the Western Fair offices were working under a handicap in that the electric power was off for quite a while and, in order to keep up with the great rush of work it was necessary to work by the aid of the headlights on a motor car outside the building.

So many people of all descriptions, sizes and ages are visiting the wicket in front of the secretary's office, requiring general information, that it is necessary to have many appearances, the famous "bread line."

A large tent has been erected for the new fire truck department and this will be open to the public on Monday. Word was received by Chief Aiken this morning that the truck will arrive in the city tomorrow.

More Barn Room Needed.
So many entries were made of all classes of horses that it is necessary for the fair board to insert advertisements in the papers calling for barn room throughout the city.

Several owners of booths at the grounds, with an eye to all the business people, have already opened up with a full stock of everything on hand.

MUST PASS BYLAW BEFORE POLICE CAN COMMENCE CLEAN UP

London and Port Stanley Railway Has No Power Over Constables.

ST. THOMAS, Sept. 8.—Before the staff of the city police may proceed to prosecute or remove the frequenters of the area on the south side of the London and Port Stanley station a by-law must first be passed by the council, directing the police to act. The London commission has no control over the local police department. If the railway authorities desire to get rid of their guests on the curb there the local authorities say it is for them to make the railroad police to remove them. In case of disorderly conduct by any of the frequenters, which as yet has never been reported, the St. Thomas staff would, the chief states, certainly interfere. So far the local police have had no complaints made of any misconduct by the patrons of the road, or anyone else in the depot grounds or vicinity.

To Accommodate Pupils.
That a more accommodating service on the street cars may be given to the school children in the southeast end of the city, the Rees street car will leave at 8:40 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. The change will permit the pupils to reach Pearl Street School 10 minutes ahead of the opening time.

Sunday Services Curtailed.
Because of the lessening of the Sunday revenue and indifference shown by the patrons to the afternoon service, the two large cars will be the only conveyances on the Belt line. These will be operated every half hour, and will connect with the Wilson avenue line.

LONDON LEADS IN MOTOR SPIRIT, SAYS THE TORONTO GLOBE

Warm Praise Given to Work
of London Motor
Club.

There are more road signs and better ones between this city and Windsor and westward to Sarnia than in any other section of the province of Ontario, according to D. Davis of the Ontario Motor League. This splendid achievement, which has turned London and vicinity into a veritable tourists' paradise, as far as road signs are concerned, is due almost entirely to the activities of the London Motor Club, which is composed of nearly 1,000 car owners of this city and vicinity.

Tribute to London.
The following tribute was paid to London by the Toronto Globe in a recent issue:

"The city of London, Ontario, is imbued with the motor spirit. It compares favorably with any city on the continent regardless of size or population, in its motor regulations, signs for parking, driving, stopping traffic, one-way streets; in fact, every device from a mechanical direction sign to paved roads have been installed. This is a correct attitude to take, because, although small, London is growing rapidly and the citizens and the authorities will learn to cope with the traffic problem before it has grown out of bounds."

Not So Small Now.
The local authorities and the officials of the London Motor Club are grateful for such recognition, but they believe that the article was written before London's corrected population figures were given out by the department of statistics in Ottawa. They think that London hardly deserves to be termed small any more. While there is much talk of it at the present time, London possesses no one-way streets as yet.

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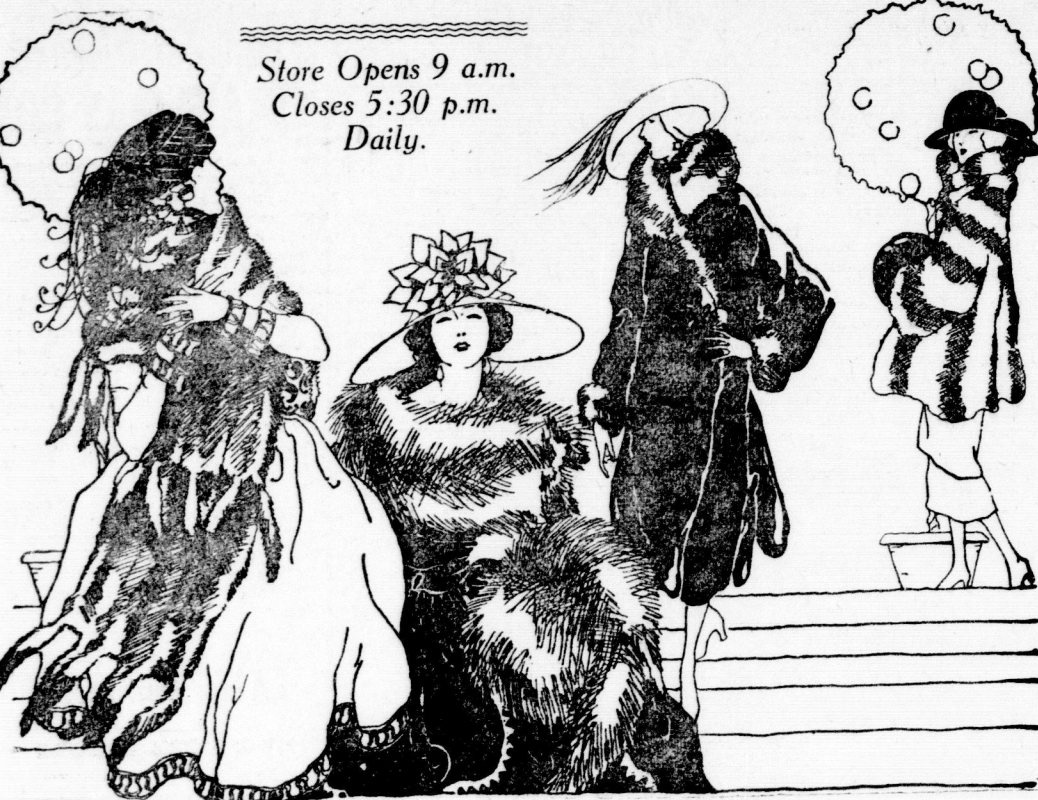
