

France Labors On Reconstruction On Third Armistice Anniversary

PARIS. Nov. 11.—France worked today, the third anniversary of the armistice which ended hostilities between the Germans and the victorious allied armies. There were a few scattered ceremonies incident to the day, but the formal holiday had been postponed by Government proclamation until Sunday, as a demonstration to the world that the nation is in earnest in its work of reconstruction.

Early this week the Chamber of Deputies voted to make Armistice Day a public holiday but the Senate rejected the bill, insisting that no new holidays should be added in view of the present period of economic depression.

The foreign representatives here, however, together with delegations The foreign representatives here, nowever, together with delegations from the French societies of war veterans, held to their custom of visiting the grave of the unknown poilu at the Armistice De Triomphe, which they massed with poppies and other flowers.
