## FINED \$10 FOR SMALL LOAVES

City Baker Haled to Court for Having Under-Weight Bread.

#### Explains Product Had Been Steamed But Had Dried Out.

Dropping casually into a downtown store the other day, J. W. McCallum, health and food inspector, seized a dozen loaves of bread exhibited there for sale. A subsequent test of the same on the government scales revealed the fact, he states; that they were all under weight. As a result, the manufacturer of the same appeared in police court Friday morning, was found guilty and assessed \$10 and costs.

The storekeeper testified that the bread in question had been delivered to him an hour or two before the inspector appeared.

The defendant explained that the oread had been made about 36 hours previous, and had lost weight by its age. It was an unavoidable wastage. ne declared, as the bread was stale. It had been steamed, he explained, for the occasion. "Made so to catch the trade," he explained.

Both the magistrate and the inspector appeared quite mystified as to this co-called "steaming process," voicing the information that they had never heard tell of the same before "You know that you are subject to a heavy fine," said the magistrate.

Kiwanians, at the noon luncheon in the Tecumseh House, Friday, were able to listen to a man who has studied boy development both in Canada and the United States, exto London as having the finest system of boy training and development on Secretary Tanner Announces the continent.

Floyd Maine, an old Londoner, and graduate of Western University, who addressed the Kiwanians on the subject of boy development along the lines of citizenship, referred to the Canadian standard efficiency system of training as the finest in the world and made the statement that the finest piece of boys' work on the continent was being done right here in London by the Y. 
