This time however, he out-pointed the Ted Kid and relieved him at least one, perhaps more than one Lewis' titles.

Lewis, former welterweight champion of the world, returned to England after his lest defeat by Jack Britton in America and surprised Brittons by winning three titles. He took the European welterweight championship with ease and had no more trouble winning the middleweight crown. Then he stopped Boy McCormick, for the British light heavyweight championship. He went after Georges Carpentier's title of world light heavyweight champion, but was stopped in one punch.

Todd is a light hitter, due to his specializing in defensive work when he was learning the game from a tutor. It is a question whether he captured the Ted Kid's British light heavyweight championship along with the European middleweight title.
