## KID LEWIS ROSES HIS CROWN TO ROLAND TODD

Latter Gets Decision On Points in Twenty-Round Go.

### PLANS U. S. VISIT

Todd Announces Intention To Trail Johnny Wilson To Lair.

Special Cable to The Advertiser. London, Feb. 14.—(Kid) Lewis lost his title of European middleweight champion to Roland Todd of Doncaster in a 20-round fight here Thursday night. Todd had been scheduled for a one time in defensive boxing and his failure to do any of the attacking was his decision in a previous match with Lewis. This time, however, he out-pointed the Ted Kid and retained his title of at least one, perhaps more than one of Lewis' title.

Lewis former welterweight champion of the world, returned to England after his last defeat by Jack Britton in America and surprised Britons by winning three titles. He took the European welterweight championship with ease and had no more trouble winning the middleweight crown. Then he stopped Boy McCormick, the British light heavyweight champion. He went after Georges Carpentier, the world light heavyweight champion, but was stopped in one punch.

Todd is a light fighter, due to his specializing in defensive work when he was learning the game from a tutor. It is a question whether he can carry the Ted Kid's British light heavyweight championship along with the European middleweight title.
