WINNIPEG, May 23.—(Special)—A dividend of ten per cent. has been declared by the liquidators of the Commercial Bank of Manitoba, which makes an aggregate of 80 per cent. to the creditors. The total amount refunded, including preference claims, since the failure of the bank, is \$1,141,863.
