DALHOUSIE CITIZENS ARE UNANIMOUS FOR LOCAL OPTION.

STEAMSHIP SERVICE NEEDS A SUBSIDY

Serves a Large and Important District Not Herebefore Touched.

PETITIONS FORWARDED

A few years ago a number of Gloucester county gentlemen organized a steamship company to operate a steamer along the lower St. Lawrence Chaleurs ports and a weekly service to Bonaventure ports. A small steamer was purchased and the route between Caraquet, Miramichi, Shippagan and Bonaventure faithfully served, despite the fact that the service was not a paying investment. The service is of the utmost importance to residents along this route, but more especially to the large number of inhabitants residing on Miscou Island, who in former years had to depend upon a sail boat ferry to keep them in touch with the mainland. Miscou Island has grown in importance during the past few years, its trade having grown about three hundred per cent. in that time, and now districts are being opened up.

The present company "The Gloucester Navigation Co." cannot possibly continue the service, unless a substantial subsidy is granted by the Dominion Government and strong representations, backed up by petitions largely signed by the electors of Gloucester county have been made to the Dominion authorities and no doubt the matter will be favorably considered.

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CROWDED MEETING AT THE COURT HOUSE HEAR CLERGYMEN OF ALL DENOMINATIONS SPEAK IN FAVOR OF LOCAL OPTION CAMPAIGN RESOLUTIONS PASSED.

The meeting held last evening in Dalhousie under the auspices of the Local Option Association was a great success. The court house was crowded to the doors. The utmost enthusiasm and harmony prevailed. The large and representative audience listened with the deepest interest and rounds of applause greeted the different speakers as they scored the liquor traffic for the poverty, crime and human degradation caused by its influence. Mr. Chas. Stewart acted as chairman and introduced the speakers. Seated on the platform were Rev. A. A. Boucher, parish priest of Dalhousie, Revs. W. J. Bates and J. H. Kirke of Dalhousie, and P. J. Stackhouse of Campbellton.

After a few words of introduction the chairman introduced Father Boucher as the first speaker. His address which was delivered with great earnestness and power, made a deep impression upon the audience. His triple plea to banish the saloon from Dalhousie for the sake of the boy, the wife and the drunkard, was a most eloquent appeal. The most impressive moment, however, in the whole address, was when in closing after speaking as a citizen to fellow citizens and urging them to vote against license he addressed in particular the members of his own congregation and as their priest pleaded with them to go to the polls and by their vote strike a blow at that traffic which is the fruitful source of so much suffering and sin. Hardly less forcible were the twelve reasons given by him why the saloon should be banished from our midst. It was a strong and forcible arraignment of the saloon as it exists today.

The following is a brief summary of the address.

Rev. A. A. Boucher.

In opening he referred to the very great pleasure with which he came before the meeting to speak to the town voters on the liquor question. This question at this time is occupying the mind of nearly all nations and which demands the attention of all men, irrespective of party or creed.

He knew that some had made use of the argument Alcohol like other creations of an all-wise God had its uses. So he thought might also be said of such harmless commodities as Strychnine, Dynamite or even Rifle Bullets. (Applause.)

Certainly he would admit that it depended upon the use or misuse of the Alcohol. Alcohol, he believed, was necessary in relation to some industries, but had no place on a list of drinkables, and the abuse of it is most certainly bad.

Death, slow or rapid is bound to overtake the drinker of alcoholic beverages; but, whether rapid or slow, none the less terrible or sure. With out a doubt the drunkard will shorten his life. The man who cannot be called really a drunkard, but who admits to taking a drink will be called upon to a realization of the fact that when he drinks he takes into his system a poison, which is most surely paralyzing his body and mind. That he may think himself all right until some day he is stricken down with grave symptoms. Medical assistance being called the doctors often pronounce themselves puzzled until he dies, after which the verdict brings to light the cause, which is of course Alcohol, poisoning.

He had no statistics, but the late Wm. Ewart Gladstone, the grand old man of British politics had stated that Alcohol had killed more people than plague, pestilence and war combined, and the speaker believed that nine tenths of the human race appreciably shorten their lives through the use of alcohol.

We all, he knew, believe in the soul and that God created man in His own image and to have dominion over all the beasts. Man hath reason, will and soul to guide him in the following of the divine plan. How can the superior creature be reconciled to the destruction of these God-given privileges.

The word "Intoxicated" was derived from the Greek Toxikon, meaning a poison and here we have to recognize a most virulent poison which is sapping the life's blood of the nation. Reason, will and all the fine feelings of mankind succumb to the awful effects of this universal blight. And why of all the animals, should man alone go under in the fight against this great curse of liquor? Man, the masterpiece of creation, who stands

upright before the face of God and whose face looks ever Heavenward. The speaker then referred eloquently to Philip Bourne's "Song of the Bottle" giving his hearers the moral contained therein.

He called upon his hearers in the sacred name of the home, the sanctuary, the meeting place of all human aspirations of love and humanity of sweetness, happiness and contentment, asking the question: What is that which will profane this sanctuary, and pointing to the answer, The Demon of Drink.

Think, he said, of the broken heart of the young wife. Think of the misery caused the good mothers of the erring sons. Think of the present and of the future, how society is shattered to its very foundations by this same Demon Drink.

What, he said, is responsible for many prisons, penitentiaries, reformatories and asylums, and who pays for them if not the sober people. And now comes the question of the "Atheist" people. What shall we do to prevent all this? Shall we ask our Government to give us a License Law which will in turn give us all license? Have we not done so already?

The saloon has been given its "air trial" and today stands self-condemned. The License has been conferred by the public as a yearly bounty, and by the public the law says it can be taken away. Therefore, it is your duty, he said, my duty to see that we do not let it be renewed.

The speaker then stated twelve reasons all just and valid, why the damning blight of the saloon should be removed from our midst. For the sake of home, happiness, future generations, natural health and all other measures making for the uplift of the human race.

As a father, he commanded, protect your son and vote against license.

Do you want your daughter to marry a drunkard? No! Then go to the polls and vote against license.

Have you neither sons nor daughters? Then protect others, and remember that as you will be answerable before Almighty God that future generations require that in this you do your duty.

Young men, you will not always be young. Look to the future. You will in all likelihood marry. What of your sons and daughters. Go to the polls therefore, young men, and vote against license.

The will power of the drunkard is weak. Won't you help him by removing from his path the object of his weakness?

As a citizen, as a priest, I entreat, may I demand you, that you follow the dictates of your conscience and your God and vote against license and the saloon.

Father Boucher then moved the following resolution:

"That in the opinion of this assembly, it is expedient for the general welfare and well-being of our town, that the saloon be abolished."

The resolution was carried unanimously.

Rev. Mr. Bates, who seconded the resolution, also made a very eloquent appeal to the electors to do their duty on the 19th and vote against license. There were three things he wanted to emphasize at the very outset.

1—My attitude on the liquor question is exactly the same as the movement of the motion. Of itself I believe the vine and the fruit thereof and such like things were intended by the Almighty to be a blessing to man, but as in so many other things, man has turned God's blessing into a curse.

2—We are not standing or speaking for one party or another, all we are concerned about is to do our utmost to carry local option and of course at the same time express the wish that the ratepayers will elect a Town Council who will see that the law is enforced.

3—We attack no man or person, but have set ourselves hard as a flint against a traffic which is demoralizing and debasing alike to body and soul.

In dwelling on these three points the reverend gentleman strongly impressed the audience with the ravages which the drink traffic was making. He also paid a high tribute to Rev. Father Boucher for the stand he had so nobly taken in the local option fight. In conclusion he exhorted his hearers to do their duty and not allow personal matters or bribes of money to interfere in the carrying of their vote.

Rev. J. H. Kirke.

The next speaker was Rev. J. H. Kirke, who spoke forcibly on the issue of the campaign. He said in part: Man's duty, said the speaker, was to take an interest in his town's affairs.

He referred to his first good impressions on coming to Dalhousie, he was not long in finding one canker in our midst, one curse which was likely to cause all sorts of trouble and demoralization, which cure it is imperative that we remove.

The saloon, he said, had been weighed in the balance and found wanting.

We required something better, and that, he believed, could be found in local option.

A body of men in New York had tried some years ago to create an "Ideal Saloon" in what was known as the subway project. Two years sufficed to prove the ideal saloon scheme to be a delusion. There was no such thing as an ideal saloon, or an ideal saloon keeper, and the saloon must perforce go the way of all falling things.

The people clamored for something which would reduce crime, drunkenness and disorder. Is Dalhousie satisfied with the present?
