LOCAL NEWS PARAPHRASED.

Saturday night's arrests numbered ten, all charged with drunkenness.

Vital statistics for last week: Births, 41; marriages, 20; deaths, 33.

There is some talk of purchasing a chemical fire engine for the city.

Mr. Geo. C. Hill of the Chicago, Rock Island Pacific railroad (Davenport, Ia.) is at the Queen's.

Mr. Frank Macdonald has accepted a nomination as independent candidate for Ottawa in the legislature.

Senators McInnes of Hamilton and Plimley of Niagara, and Mr. Tom White, M.P., of Montreal, are at the Queen's.

On this day the coroner's jury in the case of St. Andrew's ward will enter the matrimonial record again next month.

Mr. Goldwin Smith has promised to address a workmen's meeting on Wednesday next, probably in St. Andrew's hall.

A blaze occurred on Yonge street yesterday in the rear of Jones's livery stables. No alarm was sounded as it was soon under control.

Mr. J. F. Joyce, agent for Joe Murphy's company, is at the American. The company appear at the Grand opera house next month.

Mr. R. S. Cassels has been called to the bar, and Mr. W. G. Wilson has been sworn in as a solicitor of the court of queen's bench.

Mr. T. A. Heintzman, treasurer of the relief fund for the sufferers by the floods on the Rhine, reports the total subscriptions to date as \$1,550.

Mr. Hall, of the Chicago Tribune, who has been following "Black-Shop" Fleming since his arrival in Canada, left for home on Saturday morning.

The new eighteen-inch pipe sewer on Queen street east, from Sumach street to Trefan, which has been in course of construction during the winter, has been completed.

At a meeting last evening of Granite lodge, No. 53, A.O.U.W., Bro. W. C. Wilkinson, P. M. W., was presented by the members of the lodge with a very handsome testimonial in the shape of a gold Albert watch-chain.

Saturday's session at the police court consisted of remanding John Linden, charged with the larceny of wearing apparel, till tomorrow, and disposing of ten drunkards. James Walton was fined \$40 for beating his wife.

A petition is being circulated praying for the pardon of Wm. H. Hopkins, who wounded his brother with a pistol in June, 1881. The brother had been serving Hopkins and his wife beyond endurance under the influence of liquor.

Saturday night was very dark, the lamps were unlit and store thieves were at work. A window was broken in C. Stier's fancy goods store in West Market street and about \$20 worth of notions removed.

The funeral of the late Wm. E. Baird, who was well known in the proof-reading rooms of the city printing offices, took place on Saturday afternoon from 179 Richmond street west. Deceased was an old soldier and his most favorite went was to follow with military tread and warlike carriage the different regimental bands when on parade.

Messrs. H. B. Jones and Beverley Jones of this city had an interview with Sir Alexander Campbell and Hon. D. L. Macpherson, relative to an amendment to the land transfer law. They petitioned for the adoption of the system prevailing in Australia. The petition, signed by companies representing \$35,470,000, is principally invested in Northwest lands.

A good audience greeted Miss Emma Thurlby and her company at the Grand opera house on Saturday night. The fair artist seems to have lost none of that charm in her voice which so captivated Toronto audience on her last appearance here. While the Shadow Song from Dinorah was executed in first-class style, it must be confessed that the "Blue Bird" in Elmhurst Town, as rendered by Miss Thurlby, was the piece of the evening. Her position in the hall brought out the lady's sweetness of expression in marked degree. Her Light From Heaven, from Countess, was exceedingly fine. John Flemming Again Arrested.

John Flemming, the hero of the Chicago bucket-shop trials, and his sister, a man-servant looking female, arrived in the city on Saturday night by the Midland train. They registered at the Albion hotel, where they remained all night. At 10 o'clock yesterday morning Detective Reid arrested Flemming on a warrant issued at the instance of David Donovan, a Grand Trunk railway baggage-man, who charges Flemming with a fraud. The case is exactly similar to the one lately perpetrated by a man in Belleville against Flemming. There are also several other charges against the complainant and talkative bucket-shop broker, and it is understood they will all be pressed. Flemming's sister, who is a widow, with three or four children, kept house for her brother in Chicago, and is said to be as deeply implicated in the bogus transactions as himself. It is alleged that she was the brain and worker of the concern. Dr. J. McMichael has been retained to defend the accused.

He was unable to speak. Dr. Thornton was on hand inside of twelve minutes, but Mr. Kay only survived the doctor's arrival three or four minutes.

Deceased was in excellent health on Saturday night. Death is supposed to have resulted from heart disease. The only word he spoke after the arrival of the doctor was the word "mother." His mother lives in New York and she was apprised by telegram of her son's sudden death. Being of a genial disposition and a superior workman, Mr. Kay was well liked by his fellow printers. He will be buried by Toronto Typographical union.

The Dominion Grange met on Saturday morning in the legislative hall for its second day of business. Bro. Newcomb in the chair. The executive committee submitted its report. The report gave an interesting account of the progress of the projects and the present condition of the grange order. It referred to the issue of circulars asking candidates for the last dominion election to pledge themselves against the amalgamation of railways, and not to accept any free passes on any railway. It also touched on the cultivation of tobacco and other matters of minor interest. The grange meets again to-day.
