Shoals of Visitors.

Editor World: The prosperity of Toronto might be very much increased by the formation of an association similar to those found in many continental cities. These organizations are supported by voluntary subscriptions, and their object is to attract visitors, by circulating information on the advantages of visiting or residing in their city. These associations have, in their respective cities, a permanent office and paid secretary, who furnishes information as to board, lodgings, schools, cabs, amusements, etc., free of charge, keeps a register of all visitors, receives and forwards letters if desired, arranges for music, fireworks and illuminations in the public parks, excursions on the lake, etc. I refer more particularly to Geneva, which by this means has largely in creased the number of annual visitors, until now jit exceeds 150,000 per annum—more than twice their own population. The profit on souvenir spoons alone more than repays the cost of the merchants' subscriptions to their association.

I would suggest the formation of "an association for the encouragement of foreign visitors." Toronto has special features, which would make it very attractive to Americans and Europeans, if better known. The way to do this is to issue and circulate gratuitously an official guide (not disfigured by advertissments) showing and illustrating our parks, folleges, schools, institutions, clubs, giving information as to the cost of education, living, amusements, summer temperature, etc.


