NEWFOUNDLAND ASKS HELP.

ASSISTANCE SOUGHT FROM THE IM-PERIAL GOVERNMENT. rupt Colony-No Action Can Be Taken Without the Sanction of Parliament
-Run on the Savings Bank For Gold, London, Dec. 13.-One of the officials

London, Dec. 13.—One of the officials of the Colonial Office stated in an interview this morning that the late Government of Newfoundland had asked the Home Government for assistance to weather the financial ktorm. Nothing had been done in the matter. Such an appeal from a self-governing colony, he said, was unprepedented. The flovernment would be unable to take any action in the matter without the authority of Parliament.

Ottawa, Dec. 13 .- To the truthful correspondent who honestly desires to re-cord facts and to avoid sensationalism and speculative rumors, the situation here to-day is very trying.
