FIRE AT SAULT FATAL TO FOUR-YEAR-OLD BOY

SAULT STE. MARIE, April 30.—George Turcotte, 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Turcotte, is dead from suffocation as a result of a fire which wrecked the family home this morning and a younger brother, Roy, aged three, was seriously burned. Roy was rescued by J. W. Cottenden, truck driver with the fire department, who entered the smoke-filled bedroom.

The origin of the fire, which apparently started in the kitchen, has not been determined. The father had left the house only a short time after preparing his own breakfast. The mother detected a smell of smoke and started down stairs to investigate, but the fire spread so quickly and the smoke became so dense that she was unable to get back up the stairs.

SYDNEY MINES SEEK TO SAVE STEEL PLANT

SYDNEY MINES, N. S., April 30.—Mayor Nicholson has called an emergency meeting of the Town Council and is seeking the aid of North Sydney in an endeavor to retain the Scotia steel plant, which formerly employed about 1,000 men. It is also stated that petitions are to be sent to the Provincial and Federal Governments seeking their co-operation along this line. These activities follow the official announcement made by the British Empire Steel Corporation to the effect that 75,000 tons of Wabana ore at the North Sydney pits are to be shipped to the steel works at Sydney.

DELEGATION OF 39 ALL PLEDGED FOR COOLIDGE

BOSTON, April 30.—With the vote count favorable to the present candidate of Hiram Johnson, overwhelmingly defeated, a delegation of 39 solidly pledged to President Coolidge was elected to represent Massachusetts at the Republican national convention in the presidential campaign primary yesterday, according to returns virtually complete to-day.

Some of the critics are severe upon the repeal of the McKenna duties and the Government's attitude toward imperial preference. These will be special subjects of attack in the budget debate by the Conservatives, and some confidence is expressed that a compromise regarding the McKenna tariffs may be arranged before the budget is finally passed.

The Liberals, as champions of free trade, naturally favor the repeal of the McKenna duties, but even the Liberal Daily News thinks the three months' grace given the motor and other trades affected is far too short to enable these industries to make the necessary adjustments to meet the changed conditions, and it advocates gradual extinction of the duties in three successive installments.

But all these questions of finance and protective tariffs are swamped as regards the masses of the people, in the great satisfaction at the cheapening of goods and drinks, especially the big reduction in the tea duty. It can hardly be realized in Canada what tea means to the British workers. In the North of England and in Scotland, even more than in the south, tea is consumed in prodigious quantities by the workers at all hours.

Among the minor points in Mr. Snowden's speech was an announcement that the consumption of spirits had not continued to decline as previously, but instead had slightly increased of late.

Dealing with the estimates for the fighting services, he remarked that, notwithstanding the expansion of the air force, the estimates were nearly £7,000,000 less than those of the previous year.

COOLIDGE AND COX ARE FAVORITES IN OHIO

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 30.—Both President Coolidge and former Governor James M. Cox, of Ohio, the Democratic candidate for president in 1920, won sweeping victories in Ohio's primary elections yesterday. The vote, however, was probably the lightest cast in an Ohio primary election, it being officially estimated at about 18 per cent of the potential vote.

President Coolidge not only won the state's 51 delegates to the national convention, but also was given better than a six-to-one endorsement over United States Senator Hiram Johnson, of California, in the presidential preference contest.

Mr. Cox will probably go before the Democratic national convention with his home state's 45 votes pledged to support him and backed up by a popular endorsement of his party by two out of three voters in the state.

A half-to-one vote over William Gibbs McAdoo. His probable 48 votes will be represented by 22 delegates, eight delegates at large each having but half a vote.

SNOWDEN BUDGET WIDELY PRAISED

British Press Thinks MacDonald Position More Solid.

SOME CRITICS SEVERE

Repeal of McKenna Duties Is Warmly Attacked.

LONDON, April 30.—This morning's London newspapers of all shades generally concede that the budget introduced in the House of Commons yesterday by the chancellor of the exchequer, Philip Snowden, is a very clever one, which, on the whole, is bound to be distinctly popular throughout the country. Naturally there is adverse criticism of some of the features of the plan, but the Labor chancellor nevertheless has every reason to be gratified at the reception of his first budgetary performance, which, it is widely admitted, is so favorable to interests that if the Government called an election now it probably would be returned in possession of real power, instead of merely holding office through the sufferance of the other parties.

There is, however, no suggestion that the Government contemplates such a step, which seems all the less called for as the budget has won the golden rule of no increase in taxation while the administration mainly depends for its continuance in office.

CONSERVATIVES SURPRISED

The Conservatives do not conceal their surprise at the chancellor's moderation. They had feared increases in the death duties and the super-tax, and their relief at the latter was altered to disappointment at the abolition of the corporation profits tax, but they regard these favors as intended for propaganda purposes, to disarm the suspicions of the anti-Socialist part of the community.

The financial commentators say the fact that the chancellor's proposals left the sinking fund untampered with and provided for no increase in taxation will have a favorable effect in the city and is likely to lead to improvement in the best classes of securities. They are, however, such criticisms as the following from The Times:

The chief fault with the budget, from a purely financial viewpoint, is its excessive optimism. It was upon the assumption that his estimate of £282,000,000 revenue was correct that he had the unexpectedly large reductions in certain kinds of taxation, but should the estimate be unrealized it is hard to see how he can avoid a raid upon the sinking fund."

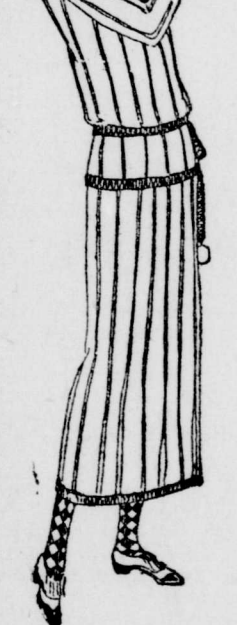

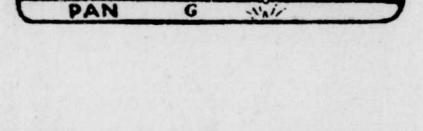
