GOING DATES

AUG. 14 Stations south of, but not including main line, Toronto to Sarnia, including Toronto.
AUG. 17 Main line Toronto to Sarnia and stations north, except north of Cardwell Junction and Toronto on North Bay Section.
AUG. 22 From all points Toronto and east to and including Sharbot Lake and Kingston, and north of Toronto and Cardwell Junction on North Bay and Midland Divisions.

One way second class tickets will be sold to Winnipeg only. Representative farmers, appointed by Manitoba and Saskatchewan Governments, will meet laborers on arrival at Winnipeg. Free transportation will be furnished at Winnipeg to points where laborers are needed. A certificate is furnished when each ticket is purchased, and this certificate, when executed by farmer showing that laborer has worked thirty days or more, will be honored from that point for a second class ticket back to starting point in Ontario, at \$18.00, prior to Nov. 1st, 1906. Tickets will be issued to women as well as to men, but will not be issued at half fare to children. Tickets are good only on special Farm Laborers' trains. Harper—Fitzsimons, that By-law No. 11, authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow money for township purposes be finally passed.—Carried.

Harper—Fitzsimons, that the Reeve and Mr. Blain be commissioners on McGill local drain.—Carried.

Blain—Raycraft, that this Council instruct the Reeve to sign the petition of the McGill award drain to convert it into a local drain.—Carried.

Blain—Fitzsimons, that the petition of Mr. Sisson on the McGill award drain be accepted and the Clerk instruct the Engineer to examine the same and report.—Carried.

The Council then adjourned to meet on Monday, Aug. 13th, at one p. m.
