The Sunshine Saving Scheme

The British Parliament is on the
eve of passing the Daylight Saving
Bill, under which clocks are to be put
forward one hour in the summer
months and back an hour in the win-
ter ones.

In this country Halifax and Win-
nipeg have adopted the scheme, and
in the States, Detroit, Cleveland,
Pittsburg and other large cities are
using it.

The advantages claimed are a gain
of 154 hours of daylight, the saving
of millions of money in artificial light,
an immense saving in the consump-
tion of fuel, better sleep because of
the added hours of darkness to sleep-
ing time, and improved health through
increased opportunities to get exercise
in daylight.

The effect of the scheme would be
to make the day fit man's require-
ments more closely. We should
simply replace a working day con-
taining a number of hours of sunlight
by another containing one hour of
sunlight more—and that in the only
period now available to most people
for leisure and recreation.

The gain of one hour of sunshine
each evening yields more advantages
than would a half-holiday each week.
For the whole period in each year
covered by the proposal the gain
will amount to 153 hours' sunlight,
the equivalent of say 18 whole holi-
days. The whole cost of the scheme
is simply the moving of the hands of
the clock forward one hour in April
and backward one hour in October.

Daylight Saving Bills are being
considered by the Parliaments of
Great Britain, Australia, New South
Wales, Canada and New Zealand. In
each case a select committee has been
appointed, has received evidence, and
has reported strongly in favor of the
Bill.

Regina has had it in force for two
years and would not change. In ad-
dition Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary
and other western cities will adopt

the system this year. In British
Columbia the Royal Commission on
Labor, in its report said: "We are
therefore in accord with the proposal
to take more advantage of the day-
light hours at our disposal."

The scheme should be adopted by
Dominion Parliament and the clocks
set back from one end of the country
to the other.

The Late Malcolm Dewar

A respected resident of Sarnia in the
person of Malcolm Dewar, passed away
at his residence 280 North College avenue,
on Saturday last, May 6th, at the age of
57 years and 8 months. Mr. Dewar had
been ill a few weeks from typhus pneu-
monia, and despite all that medical skill
could do, never recovered from the
attack. Mr. Dewar was well and favor-
ably known in Sarnia and county, and
was representative of the Goodison
Thresher Co. for a number of years. The
works of the above company closed down
to allow the employees to attend the
funeral as a mark of respect. The fun-
eral took place on Tuesday afternoon at
1.30 o'clock to the South Plympton cem-
etery. Services were conducted by Rev.
J. J. Patterson, of St. Andrews Presby-
terian church, of which the deceased was
a faithful member.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Joseph
Decoteau, J. Harkness, W. Harkness,
V. P. Dawson, Geo. Taylor, and W. T.
Goodison.

The late Mr. Dewar is survived by his
wife, two sisters, Mrs. Thornicroft, and
Mrs. L. Harkness, and two brothers,
Duncan in the west, and John in British
Columbia.

Mr. Dewar was a resident of Watford
for many years.

Takes Over Birnam Factory

The Lambton Creamery Co. Ltd.,
made arrangements last week with the
Birnam Maple Grove Cheese factory
whereby they took over the business of
the latter company. Birnam, which is
north of Watford, is the centre of an im-
portant agricultural district, the "make"
of the factory being last season over
120,000 lbs. The patrons are most en-
thusiastic over the transfer and already
nearly 200 of them have signified their
intention of patronizing the newly or-
ganized concern. Mr. M. J. Easton, of
London, a gentleman of wide experience,
has been secured by the Lambton Cream-
ery Co. as head cheese maker. He
assumed his duties last week and cheese
making started on Monday.

The Lambton Creamery Co. has been
in operation fifteen years and under the
management of Mr. G. M. Cary, is build-
ing up a steadily increasing business. It
now ranks among the largest creameries
in the Province. The output last year
was approximately 500,000 pounds.—
Petrolia Advertiser.

Mr. J. G. McIntosh of Warwick. He en-
closes a hay ticket which he picked up in
France. The ticket shows that the hay
was put up by D. C. Monro of Alvington.
Among other things Pte. Howard says:
—"This is some country. I would soon-
er be here than in England; we have
better times, better food and not so much
red tape. I landed here on the 16th of
March and they sent us up country.
Don't know where we are. We are
stopping at a French farm and sleeping
in a stable loft, beneath which are cattle
and pigs and you may guess there is
some smell. We can hear the sound of
the guns quite plainly and we can see
the fire from them at night. Give the
old boys around Watford my respects. I
saw Stan Rogers since coming here. I
am sending you a hay ticket found on
the horse lines in France. I was sur-
prised to think that hay would come so
far." D. C. Monro packed hay at J.
McIntosh's place last year, and the
ticket found may have been on a bale
packed at the latter's place.
