PLOWING CONTEST
(Continued from page 2)

What James J. Hill proved to be in the
encouragement of the progressive agri-
culture in the west, George E. Gra-
ham, general manager of the Dominion
Atlantic Railway, is proving to be for
western Nova Scotia, for the competi-
tion was his conception, made pos-
sible by his enterprise, and he found
able supporters in Professor Blair, of
the Experimental Farm, Kentville, and
Principal Cumming, of Truro.

Wednesday was given over to dem-
onstration of tractors at work on the
Experimental Farm. Potato diggers,
manure spreaders and other labor-
saving farm machinery was also in
operation.

The threatening weather of the
morning kept back many of the early
visitors, who otherwise would have
come to the Experimental farm, but
several hundred had gathered by 11
o'clock to look over the labor-saving
farm machinery on exhibition and to
hear an address by the director of the
farm, Professor W. Saxby Blair.

So interesting were some of Pro-
fessor Blair's statements they could
almost be classed as startling. For
instance he showed to the visitors a
forty-five acre field of turnips which
had been planted since July 15 upon
land from which a crop of clover vary-
ing from a ton and a half to three tons
per acre had been already taken.

These turnips had been planted for a
special purpose. Next year seventy-
five acres will be planted with the
roots for the purpose of seed raising.
Professor Blair strongly impressed
upon the assembled farmers the danger
there was of a turnip seed famine for
1918 and 1919. From the Scandi-
navian countries, where in times past
the most of our turnip seed was raised,
we could not expect further sup-
plies. The farmers of those countries
were finding under existing conditions,
that it was more profitable to use the
land for other crops. Every farmer
should set aside at least one barrel of
turnips to plant next year for the pur-
pose of seed raising.

Another very interesting statement
by the professor, was in regard to flax
two acres of which are growing on the
Experimental farm. Last year one
acre was grown and the product was
sent to Ottawa, where it was worked
up by a Belgian, expert in the business.
In his report on the Nova Scotia flax,
the Belgian stated that in his 29 years
experience in Belgium, a country fam-
ous for its flax, he had never seen flax
of more excellent fibre than that
grown in Nova Scotia. An experi-
ment on the farm in hemp raising, had
proven equally satisfactory. Such ex-
periences, said Professor Blair,
should induce our people to enter upon
flax and hemp raising. The great de-
mand for flax at the moment is from
the airplane factories. The airplane
factories at present being established
in the United States will have a cap-
acity which will use up the entire sup-
ply of flax produced on this continent
in one week's work.

Another crop which has been grown
with great success on the Experimen-
tal farm at Kentville, is alfalfa. The
remarkable success attained in the
growing of this crop is attributed to
the use of ground limestone. Many
experimental tests with various fertil-
izers used on the farm have demon-
strated those of greatest value
under given conditions. A large
acreage of young orchard, planted four
years ago, and already bearing fruit,
was inspected with care and interest
by the assembled farmers.

In closing his address, Professor
Blair gave George E. Graham, general
manager of the Dominion Atlantic
railway, credit for being the man to
bring about the plowing competition
and the demonstration of the tractors.
He had been ably seconded by Prin-
cipal Cumming and the department of
agriculture.

Already the farmers are talking of
another great plowing competition
next year. Even those who predicted
failure for this year's attempt are now
telling of how they could plow as ex-
cellent furrows as those who won the
first prizes. The next competition will
have to look for an even larger farm
or series of farms. The enterprising
manager of the Dominion Atlantic
Railway has certainly "started some-
thing."

After Nov. 1st, the net profits of
Canadian millers will be limited to a
maximum average of 25 cents on the
milling of sufficient wheat to make a
barrel of flour of 196 lbs. and the offals
produced in connection with such
milling.

**FITNESS DEMAND
CAUSES SURPRISE**

Many Canadians at Home Did Not
Realize How Important Perfect
Condition Looms at the Front

OTTAWA, Oct. 15—The operation of
the Military Service Act, as it has been
explained in the press by the Military
Service Council has aroused con-
siderable interest throughout the
country. Many people, according to
reports reaching official quarters here
are surprised at the importance as-
sumed by physical fitness in the mak-
ing up of armies for active service.

As a matter of fact, physical con-
dition is all important in the case of
a soldier, explains a high official of the
Militia Department. You will rarely
find a veteran soldier who is not pos-
sessed of an extremely strong consti-
tution. For the onerous duties of
fighting in the trenches, men must be
in perfect condition and that is why
a certain percentage only of many
thousands of reserves is available at
any time for immediate reinforcement.
Men who are not in category "A1"
when the call comes cannot be taken.
To many men, indeed, it is one of
the attractions of military life that
rugged health is demanded of those
who would go to the front—where the
vast majority of soldiers in training
are always eager to go.

**FINAL WORD FOR
MEDICAL BOARDS**

Official Bodies Must Pass On Each Man
Called Up Under Military
Service Act.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15—A number of
doctors throughout the country have
been writing here to ask if a certificate
of physical unfitness from a family
physician will be accepted at face
value by a Medical Board instituted
under the Military Service Act. The
answer returned was a prompt nega-
tive.

Experience has shown that some
family physicians are liable to be placed
in an awkward position if certifi-
cates of physical unfitness granted by
them are competent to secure freedom
of responsibility under the Military
Service Act for the sons of some of
their patients. Doctors might easily
be subjected to annoyances of a most
disagreeable kind if the idea were to
spread that any one of them, with a
wave of his pen, might exempt a
young man from military service.
Under the scheme by which the Mil-
itary Service Act is operated, the au-
thorities will be guided by the Official
Medical Boards.

"Full" Twice in One Month.

For the first time since 1899, there
were two nights in September on

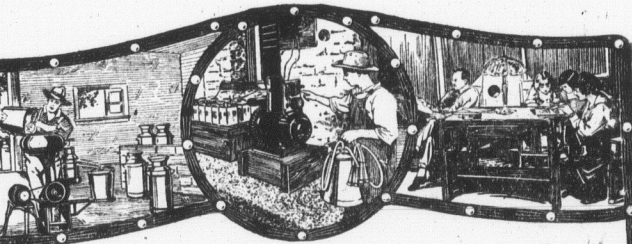
