## ARRIVAL OF THE BISHOP.

The Catholics of Halifax had been eagerly watching the signal staff for some days, expecting to behold the intimation of the Bricappin's approach. They were a little disappointed, on Thursday smorning, to find a heavy fog settled over the harbour and the city It was feared that the steamer should be bliged to stay butside until the weather would have cleared. However, as the Mibernia had entered noiselessly and successfully, during a similar fog, a watchful eye was directed towards the harbour during the morning The people were not disappointed. At it past 12 o'clock, the noble pilgrim of the Atlantic presented her gigantic proportions, making her irresistible may towards her pld station. Shortly the people were seen in hundreds making for the wharf.
