On that ground I ask the minister to give consideration to a further extension of leave for our boys who are on embarkation leave.

Mr. RALSTON: Sick leave.

Mr. GRAYDON: That sounds reasonable.

Item agreed to.

Progress reported.

1. Loans approved under the National Housing Act, 1938, and the Dominion Housing Act, 1935, to December 31, 1942, were used to finance the construction of 23,606 housing units.

2. The estimated construction costs of residential dwellings built under the provisions of the National Housing Act, 1938, and the Dominion Housing Act, 1935, to September 30, 1942 (latest available date) were \$92,049,322.

3. The administration costs of the National Housing Act, 1938, and the Dominion Housing Act, 1935, to December 31, 1942, total \$555,415.33.
