AIR TRANSPORT

REQUEST FOR OPENING OF NORTHERN AIRSTRIPS TO CLASS III OPERATIONS DURING WINTER MONTHS

Mr. Cecil Smith (Churchill): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Transport. Several remote communities in northern Manitoba are serviced by air only. In July, five airstrips were closed to class III operations, which has restricted the movement of patients to hospital. At present, patients are being moved by charter only. Because of the high cost factor, patients are having to wait long periods to receive medical attention. Will the minister consider the opening of these five airstrips to class III operations for the winter months?

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, we have been looking at the thorny question of certain airstrips in Manitoba which are substandard for certain types of operations and have not been able at this point to arrive at a conclusion which would allow that kind of operation within the ordinary bounds of safety. We will go on looking at the question, although I think the prime responsibility for bringing those airstrips up to standard should be mainly that of the builder, which is the government of Manitoba.

Mr. Smith (Churchill): My supplementary question is also to the Minister of Transport. The airstrips which are closed are now serving Indian reserves in northern Manitoba and Indian reserves are the responsibility of the federal government. I would ask the minister to consider that the airstrips were closed for summer operations and that the winter operation of airstrips is quite different in the remote frozen north.

Mr. Lang: I am quite aware of that. I am also aware of the fact that emergency circumstances may make landings necessary which ordinarily would not be considered safe. I think, therefore, that is taken care of, but that will not allow for regular operations.

AIRPORTS

MIRABEL—REASON FOR PAYMENTS TO CONSULTANTS FOR DESIGN OF RUNWAYS AND TAXIWAYS

Mr. Ron Huntington (Capilano): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Transport, but first I should like to thank the minister for his written reply to my October 27 question confirming that the official Banaim list of consultants is correct in showing the Ministry of Transport as the only agency responsible for the design of airways, aprons and taxiways at the Mirabel airport. 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spent on outside consultants for the design of runways, aprons and taxiways at Mirabel airport.
