AUTHORIZATION FOR COMMITTEE TO TRAVEL

Mr. Albert Cooper (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of State and Leader of the Government in the House of Commons): Mr. Speaker, I believe that you will find unanimous consent for me to move the following motion without debate or amendment:

That eight members and the necessary staff of the Standing Committee on National Defence and Veterans Affairs be authorized to travel to eastern and western Europe within the context of its current study on the role of the Canadian Forces in a changing world at any time between January 26, 1992 and February 16, 1992 for a period not exceeding a total of 15 days inclusive.
