The horse was shipped last night. Baron Howes is one of the finest Clydesdales that ever crossed the ocean, and was considered an unequalled specimen in Waterloo County. He was bred by John Brown of Howes, Hanan, Scotland, and as a colt won a championship in the old land. In 1907 he was imported to this country by Graham and Renfrew, Bedford Park, Toronto. In 1908 he was bought by Miss Wilks, who has owned him ever since. By Miss Wilks Baron Howes has been shown in the ring throughout Canada and the United States, and was always a first prize winner. At Toronto he won the Canadian championship, and was a winner at New York and Chicago.
