They were very defirous of knowing what country it was he belonged to; but all they could gather from him was, that he lived in a very large continent, which abounded in furs. The *Ruffians* traced the coaft of this continent two days in a fouth direction, without being able to land, when they met with fuch a ftorm as obliged them to bear away for the coaft of *Kamtfcbatka*, returning afterwards to the place from whence they had fet out.

To these discoveries of the Russians northward of the South sea, I might add those which in the course of eight years they have made on the coast of the Frozen sea, from Archangel to the tiver Kovima: but they not having been farther, I have only marked on my second map the situation of the coasts of the Frozen sea, as far as the river Kovima, according to their observations, and the remainder of the coast from the best conjectures I could form from the course which other Russians and formerly steered along the coast as far as Kamissiants in 1723, to the northward of the Frozensea, at 75 degrees latitude.

When, as I have faid, I was bufied in Ruffia in the investigation of those northern countries, it was my happines to be informed of the discoveries of Admiral de Fonte, in the South-fea, in his search after a north-welt passage, and that by a manuscript extract of the voyage of that Admiral. Judging that I could not rightly use it, before I was acquainted with my brother's course, in order to compare them, I delayed it till my return into France, where I have had the advantage of Mr. Buache's lights, who has formed a map from Admiral de Fonte's narrative : that having none, we have compared it with my brother's course, and the other informations which I got in Russia, and found a furprizing conformity betwixt them.
