That congestion of population can be sensibly relieved by improved transportation facilities is, in the opinion of John W. Paris, of New York, a of John W. Paris, of New York, a palpable fallacy. In a letter to The Record and Guide of that city, Mr. Paris says: palpable fallacy. In a letter to The Paris says:

"That congestion should be relieved goes without question. If we will but get at the cause of congestion we could most readily get at the means of relieving the same. It is well and generally recognized that the laborer will live no farther from his pace of labor than may be easily walked, un-

less he is compelled to do so. "The great congested area of this ity is found east of Fourth-avenue and

city is found east of Fourth-avenue and south of Thirty-fourth-street; another congested area which has more recent-ly grown up lies to the west of Eighth-avenue and to the north of Forty-sec-ond-street. If we will but look for the location of our great industrial enterprises where the majority of our laboring class finds employment, we will find them to the south of Forty-second-street and to the west of Fourth-avenue. The sections therefore which lie nearest to this great em-ployment centre are the great conges-tion centres.

## Toronto Lacrosse League.


