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LET THE TRIAL GO ON.

County Crown Attorney Curry has made a bold and popular stroke in prob-

ing the business of alien combinations in several lines of trade. The

plumbers were the first to come under the official eye, and the public will not

countenance any delay in getting to the bottom of the alleged conspiracy to

boom prices and to crush out opposition.

But in the meantime there is said to be an effort to head off the investigation by submitting the whole question

to a commission which may spend months in digging for evidence and

end in taking no action against those who may have been guilty of an infrac-

tion of the law which forbids combi-

nation in restraint of trade. Let the

prosecution of the plumbers be pur-

sued to the limit. Nothing should

stand in the way of the present investigation in the courts.

If there is to be a commission it

need not interfere with the full and

complete probing of the Plumbers' As-

sociation, independently conducted by

the crown authorities. The commission

is one thing, but the administration of

the law is another, and there would be

no justification in the letting up of the

criminal proceedings already instituted

by the crown authorities to enable a

broader enquiry to be carried on.

THE ALBERTA GERRYMANDER.

The recent general election in the

Province of Alberta has emphasized

the injustice of the Laurier partition

of the province into electoral divisions.

When the ridings were marked out the

people of the southern portion of the

province protested that the north were

unduly favored. Even the Liberal

newspaper at Calgary, The Alberta,

declared against the allotment. Now

it appears that the City of Calgary

politics are many who did not favor

in any riding in Northern Alberta.

There were 290 more votes polled than

in the combined ridings of Strathcona,

Leduc and Stoney Plains; 283 more than

from the City of Edmonton, which is

Stoney Plains; less than in the three

ridings of Leduc, Strathcona and

Sturgeon; 400 more than in the two

ridings of Edmonton and Stoney Plains,

and so on.

The object of the gerrymander was

to hold the capital for the City of

Edmonton. If there had been a just

division of the province, according to

population, the south would have out-

voted the north and taken the capital

from the City of Edmonton, which is

merely the temporary capital of the

province.

This state of affairs, however, is

likely to adjust itself in time. The

people of Alberta, as has been shown,

are able to turn their attention away

largely on the question of C.P.R. com-

bination and the completion of the

Grand Trunk Pacific. When the G.T.P. is

a going concern, and such further

crises will have no further effect, the

electors are likely to turn their atten-

tion to the question of the equal

division of the constituencies and the

school system. A large number of

people are of the opinion that when
