

TORONTO AS OCEAN PORT
STEAMERS SAIL DIRECT
 Three Freighters of Canadian Lake
 Line From England Here
 Without a Break.

The "Corunna," the first of the three
 new steel package freighters bought
 by the Canadian Lake Line, Toronto,
 in Britain, cleared from the Middlesex
 England, on Friday, April 22, bound
 for Toronto. She is loaded with a full
 cargo of pig iron consigned to Messrs.
 Samuel, Benjamin & Co.

The "Morena," the second steamer,
 cleared from Middlesex, England, on
 May 2. She is also loaded with pig
 iron for the above mentioned firm, and
 the "Neveda," the third steamer, will
 probably be ready to sail for Toronto
 the early part of next week with a
 full load of pig iron for the same
 firm.

These cargoes are probably the first
 on record to be consigned for from
 Canada and delivered direct by steam-
 ship from an English port to the City
 of Toronto without transfer at Mont-
 real.

While this is not an established ser-
 vice, it is an indication of what can
 be done, and in the future with deep-
 ened canals a regular servicemight be
 established, making Toronto practically
 an ocean port.

After delivering their cargoes, the
 "Morena," "Corunna" and "Neveda"
 will go into commission in the regular
 bi-weekly service between Montreal
 and the head of the lakes, carrying
 package freight up, and grain down.

The Canadian Lake Line steamers
 "A. E. Ames" and "J. H. Plummer"
 are now on their way down from Mont-
 real, loaded with grain for Fort
 William and Kingston, respectively. The
 steamer "E. M. Pellatt" left Toronto
 last Saturday for Port Arthur and
 Fort William with a full cargo of
 package freight.

The fact that she carried five auto-
 mobiles consigned to Port Arthur will
 give some idea of how that town is
 progressing.

 The regular monthly meeting of

KILL COUNT FOR DESPERADO
 California Posses End the Life of Ro-
 mantic Wanderer.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3.—The sup-
 posed desperado who was killed at
 Willows Monday night after a run-
 ning fight with a posse of officers, has
 been identified as Count Otto Von
 Waldstein of Austria, son of a noble
 family of history, nephew of the
 cardinal and to Prince Wladiwostok,
 one of the richest men in Franz
 Josef's empire.

Count Otto died fighting, believing
 he was being attacked by a band of
 robbers. The posse, thought it had
 run down Smith, the murderer of
 John Marovich of Oakland.

Count Otto Von Waldstein left Aus-
 tria and family six years ago because
 of a love affair. He fought thru the
 Boer war. He wandered to America,
 a poor man without a profession.

C.P.R. BOATS RUNNING.
 First Sailing for Fort William Sat-
 urday.

The C.P.R.'s "Upper Lake" steamer,
 "Mantoba," will sail Saturday from Owen
 Sound on the first trip of the season to
 the Soo and Fort William, followed on
 Tuesday by the Alberta, and on Thurs-
 day by the Adabasca, maintaining the
 usual tri-weekly service. These three
 popular boats have undergone a thor-
 ough overhauling during the winter
 and start the season with new decks,
 new fittings, fresh paint, and every
 convenience for the traveling public.
 Exceptionally heavy traffic by the lake
 route is looked for this year.

Unions War Among Themselves.
 PHILADELPHIA, May 3.—As a re-
 sult of a dispute among the labor
 unions representing the bricklayers,
 stone masons and granite cutters of
 this city, work on many building
 operations was suspended today by
 an order of the master bricklayers. It
 is all the unions can come to an agree-
 ment. About 400 workmen are affect-
 ed, but in a week about 30,000 men
 will be forced into idleness.

The dispute concerns the laying of
 stone after it has been made ready.
 The granite cutters, supported by the
 builders, claim they should not only
 cut the stone but lay it.

HOME RULE FOR IRISH
ON CHAMBERLAIN PLAN
 Same Relationship as Between the
 Dominion Parliament and the
 Legislatures.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
 LONDON, May 3.—With every appear-
 ance of authority, says The Telegraph,
 the statement was made in the lobby
 of the house that the government's plan
 of home rule in Ireland, as embodied in
 the Chamberlain proposal in 1886,
 which was to establish between England
 and Ireland the same relations which
 subsist between the Dominion Parlia-
 ment and the provincial legislature.

1144 EXECUTIONS.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 2.—News-
 paper statistics published to-day give
 the number of sentences imposed un-
 der the drumhead court-martial law,
 which expires to-day.

From these figures it appears that
 1144 persons were executed, 79 were
 condemned to minor terms of imprison-
 ment and 71 were acquitted.

GAS COMPANIES COMPETE.
 CHATEAUX, May 3.—It is understood
 that the Maple City Oil and Gas Co. has
 made a contract with local manufac-
 turers to supply 1,000,000 cubic feet of
 natural gas per day for manufacturing
 purposes. This will be in direct com-
 petition to the Volcanic Natural Co.

Manitoba Judges Petition.
 WINNIPEG, May 3.—The county court
 judges of Manitoba have petitioned the
 Dominion government, asking that they
 be put on the same status in regard to
 pay as the judges in Halifax, Sydney,
 St. John, and in the Province of Onta-
 rio and Prince Edward Island, and that
 the age of retirement on full pay be 70
 years of age instead of 75 as at present
 in Manitoba.

A Bump for Hughes.
 ALBANY, N. Y., May 3.—One year,
 to a day, from the time of his origi-
 nal appointment by Governor Hig-
 gins, the senate to-night reconfirmed
 Otto Kelsey in the office of state
 superintendent of insurance, giving
 only 24 of the 26 votes necessary to
 sustain Governor Hughes' recommen-
 dation of his removal from office.
 Twenty-seven votes were cast against
 removal.
