WILL 1900 BE AHEAD OF 1899?

That is a Question That Industrial and Commercial Men Are All Interested in Now.

OVER TWO THOUSAND MILLIONS

Was the Volume of Exports From Canada and the States Last Year, and It's a Record.
New York, Jan. 19.—Dun's review will set to-morrow whether the new year will surpass or keep pace with the old is the question which gives especial interest to every week's return. Comparing now with business by far the largest and most prosperous ever known a year ago—more than 40 per cent. larger than in January, 1898, which, in its turn, had shown heavier business than in any year preceding—it cannot be expected that such a gain will be repeated.

It is not so much that the volume of exports and imports last year for the first time exceeded two thousand millions but it is a gain of value beyond calculation that the year completed the progress of the United States from a debtor to a creditor or nation.

Iron Products.
This week our contract of 10,000 tons for a Western road, and two for bridges requiring 31,000 tons are the only large transactions reported in iron products, but heavy business was secured by concessions for plates at Pittsburgh going materially below 225, and for bars at Philadelphia below 220, the price of the association. The copper output of this country in 1899 was 252,206 tons—greater by 91,000, or 35 1/2 per cent. than in 1898—while the foreign product last year—\$9,240—gained in the four years only 3002 tons. The prices of copper and lead are unchanged, with the latter at 27 1/2c.

Woolen Goods.
Perhaps the most important industrial event in the success in marketing woolen goods for the new season is the price average 18 1/2 per cent. higher than last year, many makes having been promptly sold and withdrawn. While other sells so well as to give great encouragement.

Cotton Goods.
Business in cotton goods begins to increase, the staples it is still moderate, although now average 27 1/2 per cent. higher than a year ago, and with the rise this week to 7.5c, cotton is 35 per cent. higher than in January, 1898. The East in execution of old orders continues larger than in any previous year, and in fact three weeks—over 20 per cent. larger than last year and 3 1/2 per cent. larger than in 1898. But new business has not amounted to a quarter of the current production, it is said.

Breakfasts in St. Qu.
The market for breakfasts is not active, wheat being a consequence, but the active May option shows a sharp decline. In the same way, the price of flour has fallen in three weeks 6,000,225 bushels against 13,224,082 last year, and 2,000,132 against 2,201,775. Western receipts were in January 5,000,000 bushels against 13,000,482 last year. Corn exports are smaller than last year, 5,000,000 bushels for the three weeks, while receipts have been 10,385,150 bushels, against 9,010,400 last year, and the difference is caused by spot quotations at advance.

Failures.
Failures for the week have been 242 in the United States, against 249 last year, and 40 in Canada, against 45 last year.

As to Canada.
There is less complaint of dullness in retail lines and weather conditions are not satisfactory in most sections of Canada. St. John reports only moderate business, but states that the season's cut lumber will be a large one, as the winter has been favorable for logging operations. Trade conditions are satisfactory in the west, and well maintained in all lines at Halifax. The money market is quiet, and orders are well up to the market. Montreal reports prospects for spring trade encouraging, especially for drygoods, and payments are prompt, with unusual few failures. Wholesale trade is active at Toronto, and travelers are sending in large orders, while collections are very good. Exceptionally mild weather retards business in some lines at Winnipeg, but wholesale trade reports a fair volume of business, and collections are improving. Some increase is reported at Vancouver in drygoods and furnishings, but other lines are retarded by bad weather, and collections are slow.

Bradstreet's Review.
New York, Jan. 19.—Bradstreet's to-morrow will say: "General trade and prices as a whole maintain the even balance which had been the least feature for some time past, and in which it will require the advent of distinctly new features to effect any basic change."

The iron and steel industry, justly regarded as the backbone of the industrial trade, is still actively employed on old orders, and new business is limited for reasons unnecessary to recite. Cereals are dull in nearly all directions, and the pressure of enlarged stocks, particularly abroad, has been industrial this week in bringing about a reaction in wheat prices. Corn and rye, however, are rather firmer on foreign buying, the sympathy affected by the decline in the leading wheat. Lard has weakened somewhat, while pork is little changed, the price trading feature being larger receipts of hogs.

Coffee is active, speculation being influenced by higher European advances and evidence of a large domestic consumption demand. Apparently improved British prospects in South Africa are assigned as the reason for the better buying of cotton, resulting in a fractional advance this week. The crop movement still continues much smaller than expected by the bears. Cotton goods are meeting with good demand on spring account. Hatter more orders is noted for hats, particularly at Boston. Fine woools are at about the highest point reached in 20 years. Lumber is strong, particularly white pine grades. Wheat, including flour shipments, for the week, aggregate 3,010,000 bushels, against 4,248,926 bushels last week and 5,198,671 bushels in the corresponding week of 1899. Corn exports for the week aggregate 3,190,312 bushels, against 3,314,676 bushels last week, and 2,928,116 bushels in this week a year ago. Business failures are fewer in number, there being 253 for the week, as compared with 294 in the week ending this week a year ago.

Business in Canada.
Improved weather conditions, looking for better winter roads, have improved retail trade in the Province. Quebec reports spring trade as showing good gains over last season in most lines, and collections are satisfactory. Toronto reports an expanding demand, and trade conditions healthy with enlarging stocks. Industrial concerns large, and failures few. Great development in the west and Pacific coast section of the Dominion is expected. The Ontario Government will compel the manufacturing of only steel in the Province. In the Maritime Provinces, business is class
