Rescued Them From Misery.

Inspector Sanders Takes the Hobbs Children From Their Parents—A Scene of Fifth.

Inspector Sanders, of the Children's Aid Society, yesterday drove out with the reeve of Nissouri to the bivouac of the unfortunate Hobbs family—man, wife and four children—who were reported as being encamped on the roadside near Thorndale in a state of destitution, through the burning of their home a short time ago. The miserable family was found in a hovel, which had never known a floor and through the roof of which the water came as through a sieve. In fact, it was little better than the roadside, which Hobbs and his wife deserted on account of the rain. A small stove in the center of the hut filled the place with smoke.

Mr. Sanders informed the parents as to the object of his visit, which was to relieve them of the children. Weeping and wailing followed, and it would be difficult to say whether the parents or little ones cried the harder. Mr. and Mrs. Hobbs, who are alleged to be thieves and shiftless, finally consented to allow the children to go, and

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were told that their only hope of recovering possession of the little ones would be reformation and provision of a healthy and comfortable home. The eldest is a boy of 7 years, and the youngest an infant girl 2 years old. When the children reached this city they were taken to the general hospital, where the doctors found them to be suffering from a loathsome disease, contracted from the parents. Even the baby girl was in a painful condition. It was such that had medical aid not been provided, it would probably have led to the ultimate ruin of the children.

The case is one of the most heart-rending with which the society has had to deal.

Medical Advice For the Aldermen.

Hospital Building Committee Consult the Doctors.

Harmonious Meeting—Suggestions by the Professional Men—Will Work Together With a Well Henceliorth.

The hospital building committee and four representatives of the medical fraternity in the city met last night and considered the new hospital plans. The doctors said they wished to assist the committee in every way possible. A mutual understanding on some previous occasions seems to have been lacking. Those present were: Ald. Carrothers (chairman), Hunt, Gerry, Jolly, McPhillips, Wilkey, the mayor, Drs. Moorhouse, Chas. E. Chubb, Roome and Wishart, Architect McBride and Secretary Bell.

A motion was offered to furnish heating apparatus for the new hospital. Their communication was filed for reference.

Dr. Campbell stated that one point urged very strongly at the meeting of the medical profession was that the representatives be allowed to have the plans and specifications drawn up to allow the other members of the profession to look them over for a few days.

Ald. Hunt said the object of the meeting was to get the suggestions of the medical profession, and to draw up his specifications to meet the wishes of the profession at once.

Dr. Moorhouse replied that this could be done better after the specifications were ready. Without them they had no guide to go by. The doctors, he said, were desirous of assisting this committee in every way possible.

Dr. Roome supported the request for the committee said they would be willing to grant it.

Dr. Campbell, continuing, said that the profession thought it would be better if the isolation ward were a separate building as in Messrs. Moore & Henry's and Mr. McBride's plans.

The mayor contended that probably 75 per cent of the contagious diseases were met with in the winter and early spring, and at that time the prevailing winds were northeasterly. He held that if the contagious disease building were put on the southeast portion of the grounds it would interfere with the children's pavilion.

Mr. McBride, in answer to Ald. Hunt, said it would cost no more to make the contagious disease ward a separate building, but the children's pavilion would have to be moved.

Dr. Moorhouse differed with Dr. Campbell. Personally he saw no serious objection to the contagious disease building in its present position. He had always been a strong advocate of purchasing the property through to Waterloo street. The soil was dry and porous and the site high and round. This property were purchased the private pavilion could be put on Waterloo street and the contagious disease pavilion on Colborne street.

The mayor said he had obtained the city solicitor's opinion that this land could be purchased if the county council's recommendation.

Dr. Campbell's suggestion to change the location of the contagious ward was not pressed in view of Dr. Moorhouse's recommendation.

"It's a question of whichever way the wind blows," said the mayor.

Dr. Campbell made no further suggestion that the Provincial Board of Health's scheme for plumbing be followed.

This would be done, Mr. McBride said.

Some discussion arose out of the suggestion that cement flooring be put under all the buildings.

The architect said to do this would cost about \$1,500, and the doctors held that it would be money well expended.

The plans already provide for 5,000 feet of concrete in the cellars.

Dr. Moorhouse strongly urged that the cement or concrete be put in. It would keep down the ground moisture and allow of its being never thinned and kept clean. He would readily flushed of building a house without a cement floor over all the ground underneath it.

Ald. Wilkey said Architect Bodley's plan provided a cement floor under the whole hospital.

Steel girders instead of brick supporting walls were spoken of as making the finishing of the basement easier of accomplishment.
