**CRUSHED BETWEEN TWO CARS.**

**DAWSON CITY'S ONE TREE.**

Color-Sergt. Edwin J. Freeland, of the Seventh Fusiliers, has received a letter from his son, Private Frank Freeland, who is one of the 60 picked men who form the Yukon field force. Private Freeland is a member of Company A, of the Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry, and has been stationed at Dawson City during the winter. He writes interestingly of the country. His last letter dated Feb. 15, reports a very heavy immigration already set in. He refers to the story of the finding of a pre-glacial mastodon of enormous size, embedded and preserved in ice. The story was telegraphed all over the county a short time ago. Private Freeland explains that it was a pure fake, invented to advertise a Dawson City saloon. Private Freeland says there is only one tree in Dawson City—a cottonwood. It is one of the city's most prized institutions.

**ARCHBISHOP DINED AT STRATFORD.**

Archbishop O'Connor was the guest of honor at a dinner given yesterday at Stratford by Rev. Dr. Kilroy. The rectory was en fete for the event. Dinner was served at noon, covers being laid for 21. Dr. Kilroy occupied the head of the table and to his right sat Archbishop O'Connor. About the board were the following priests: Revs. Fathers Brennan, St. Marys; McKeown, St. Augustine; McCormick, Woodstock; Kreidt, Carmelite Order, Niagara Falls; Croghan and Miller, Toronto; Downie, Logan; McRae, Parkhill; Gnam, Hesson; Quinn, Bismarck; Dixon, Kingsbridge; Connolly, Ingersoll; Foster, Simcoe; Corcoran, La Salle; McCabe, Seaford; Fogarty, Irish; O'Neil, Kinkora; Cook, Stratford; and Costello, Stratford. When the covers were removed Dr. Kilroy proposed the health of the archbishop, couching his reference to his lordship in felicitous terms. His lordship responded in feeling terms, expressing the deep regret he experienced in severing his connection with this diocese. He took an affectionate farewell of the clergymen with whom he had labored for so many years. Father Brennan also spoke. Archbishop O'Connor left on the 4 p.m. train for London. Prior to leaving he was waited on by a lay delegation, who tendered congratulations.

## AMUSEMENTS

Frank Daniels Gets a Rousing Reception at the Grand.

Frank Daniels is evidently as popular as ever in London. "The Idol's Eye" drew a bumper house at the Grand last night. There wasn't a vacant seat in the house. Frank Daniels has the happy fortune to appeal with equal success to both the pit and the gallery. His fun is refined enough for the former, and genuine enough for the latter. "The Idol's Eye" is grotesque enough and furnishes sufficient scope for scenic effects to satisfy all the requirements of first-class comic opera. The scene in the second act, showing the interior of a Hindu temple, with attendant priests and priestesses, is particularly effective. The story—if the flimsy thread can be called a story—turns on the adventures of a ruby which has been stolen from the eye of an idol, and which gives its possessor an irresistible charm over women. There is a dearth of humor in the story itself, but the songs are new and catchy, the dialogue bright and witty, and the jokes fresh. Independently of the vehicle or of any accessories, Mr. Daniels' own original and inimitable humor is what makes for success. In each act he comes on and goes off by balloon. The entry in the second act is particularly good. The chorus was good and the girls pretty. Some novel groupings were introduced, and the costumes and lighting effects were exquisitely beautiful. There was a decided plethora of osculation, which got rather treacly before Mr. Daniels had satisfied his Hobson hobby. He would do well to cut a little of that out.

Yvonne Kopp, as the Nautch Girl, is very graceful and piquant. Kate Dart, the Chief Priestess, has a rich contralto voice and much talent. Alf C. Wheelan, as the Vagabond Highlander, is a genius, and forms the foil for some of the songs. "Fair Tales" and "The Tattooed Man," made decided hits. Judging by last night's reception, Frank Daniels may come to London as often as he likes.

## Classical Concert.

## DOINGS AT QUEEN'S

A Chair to the Memory of Sir John A. Macdonald Inaugurated.

Kingston, Ont., April 25.—This afternoon, shortly after 2 o'clock, the students of Queen's marched from the college to the monument of Sir John A. Macdonald and placed a beautiful wreath of roses and lilies upon the statue of the statesman. R. Burton, M.A., president of the Alma Mater Society, and J. M. Farrell, W. F. Nickle and J. S. Short, past president, made fitting references to the event. Queen's was today, they said, inaugurating a chair to Sir John's memory that would be more enduring than any that could be reared.

At 4:30 p.m. Sir Charles Tupper reached the city hall, and was greeted by a great audience. Principal Grant told of Senator Gowan's effort in behalf of a chair of political and economic science associated with the name of Sir John A. Macdonald. Several letters from various persons on the subject were read, eulogizing the movement. Already \$20,000 has been raised, of which \$6,000 was the venerable senator's gift.

Rev. Dr. Barclay, Montreal, presented Sir Charles Tupper for the honorary degree of LL.D. Chancellor Fleming wel-

comed him, and asked him to address the gathering.

Sir Charles took considerable time in a review of Canadian affairs, and the work accomplished by the late Sir John A. Macdonald. His accomplishments were enduring. He rejoiced that Kingston his name was to be perpetuated as also that of Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, who erected the Royal Military College as his monument. Sir Charles afterwards drove to the college and planted a tree. Tomorrow, in connection with the convocation, a bust of Lady Aberdeen will be unveiled, as also a memorial brass to Senator Gowan and other benefactors of the Macdonald chair of political science.
