Closing Hours of Kilties' Welcome Visit to City

Services in Queen's Park—Rous-

ing Send-Off and Inter-

change of Cheers.

Notwithstanding the disagreeable

state of the weather, a large number

of citizens attended the church parade

and service, held by the Forty-eighth

Highlanders, at Queen's Park, yester-

day morning. The regiment fell in

about 9 o'clock near their quarters on

the grounds, and after engaging in a

short drill, formed up behind the pipe

and brass bands, and marched about

the grounds, finally locating in the big

covered grandstand, where Rev. J. G.

Stuart, of Knox Church, South London,

conducted divine worship, commencing

about 9:30 o'clock. During the service

The soldiers were seated in the cen-

tral part of the stand, with the bands

at the back, while the preacher occu-

pled a temporary platform at the lower

Rev. Mr. Stuart's Address.

Obedience was the subject of the ser-

mon preached by Rev. Mr. Stuart. He

took as his text, Acts, iii, 28: "We

ought to obey God rather than men."

said, showed that Peter was right in

refusing to obey any authority but

God, and God proved that he was cor-
