Deficit in Budget Caused Dy Army Expenses and Old Age Pensions.

Paris, June 8. - The political situa. tion, or, rather, the financial situation, will furnish the Socialists occasion for a dangerous campaign. This financial situation takes into account the permanent deficit of 194,000,000 francs (\$38,800,000) for the budget next year, without counting other sums which represent expenditures already made and for which the chamber will be asked to care by authorizing an issue of short term bonds.

In this last lot of expenditures must be included about 200,000,000 frames (\$40,000,000), made during the Algecira conference, in order to place the country in a state of defense in case of war.
