

PATRIOTIC FUND DRIVE HELD OVER TILL APRIL 23-25

Campaign Postponed For One Week, Is Latest Announcement of Committee.

STANDARD IS "INCREASE"
Bigger Donations Than Ever Expected From Londoners This Year.

London's combined patriotic funds drive will be staged on April 23-25, according to the announcement made by the general committee today. It had originally been scheduled for April 16-18, but was postponed for one week because of the fact that many of the leaders had previous engagements for the first selected week.

Change in date will not adversely affect the results of the big week, committee members think, but will on the other hand really help along the work. The preliminary campaign in the previous year, and most satisfactory reports are being turned in by the canvassers who are at work.

The standard this year is to increase all gifts. Not only is the object to increase the subscriptions to the Canadian Red Cross and the patriotic fund but to the British Red Cross and the Red Cross of the United Kingdom. The aim of the committee, as announced by Industrial Commissioner Gordon Phillips, secretary, is to increase all along the line.

The committee wants increase for all objects, and from the reports we feel sure that London will live up to its previous record and respond most generously, said Mr. Phillips to the Advertiser. "The first reports are most encouraging and we believe that the week's achievement in the campaign days will really help along the object."

SUGGESTION OF TAPPING WIRES
OF UTILITIES SERVICE BRINGS
MANAGER'S ANGORA MUCH TO FORE

Recalls Days of Yore to Hydro Department Head With a Vengeance—Criticism of Policy Adopted in Connection With London Electric Question Seems General.

The well-known angora of General Manager E. V. Buchanan of the utility company has been running all over the place today. Mr. Buchanan has no kind of objection to the suggestion of tapping wires of the hydro-electric system, and when to these are added the individual troubles of the 1,400 candle-users, whose lights went out at 12:05 this morning, it is to be wondered if the G. M. gets angry?

One man called him up early today and said that, as is the best hydro practice, he intended to cut into the hydro wires and get his light. He wanted a meter, and said he would do the job quite as well as hydro did when it tapped the wires of its now defunct rival.

Mr. Buchanan did not like this a bit. It brought back memories of days that were troubled. Hydro was doing a bad thing, it could be handled in a different way, and would connect up the London Electric subscribers in their own way. It was anyone's attempt to tap the wires of the hydro system and they would see what would happen. Hydro says: "Do as we say, not as we do."

Meanwhile hundreds of citizens' homes will be in darkness or lit by the feeble glow of electrical substitutes all the way from paraffin candles to the old hanging lamp, which was used to be because it was a wedding present.

Some talk was heard that a mass meeting of London Electric subscribers was to be called today to urge some action upon the city. It was argued that the hydro authorities had been unwilling to take care of the London Electric subscribers and that it would be better to run the plant of the London Electric at least until hydro connected up the subscribers.

One criticism heard was that the hydro people were using the use of electric stoves and increasing their load when others were going without light. But it is stated that the hydro stoves could not carry their stoves and other appliances without moving them from stock and this explanation seemed reasonable.

So far as can be learned, no favorites are being played in the handling of the situation. The chief complaint is that no steps were made to operate the London Electric plant during the interval.

Hydro is today taking care of about one hundred London Electric customers. General Manager Buchanan states that the London Electric would be closed down now has applications from practically all of the London Electric customers. When they all will be connected up is another matter.
